
Message from our **Distinguished Ambassador**

Since early 2020, global attention has been focused on the novel coronavirus. COVID-19, with its huge impact on health, mortality and society around the world. The virus has placed special burdens on sexual minorities. ARCSHS has been directly involved in the disclosure and analysis of this important new knowledge. It has helped to provide evidence and advice on the special effects of the pandemic on LGBTIQ+ Australians. It has also developed new research exploring the impacts of the pandemic on the health and intimate lives of all Australians.

The work of the Centre was recognised in 2020 with a number of successful competitive grants and other funding awards in support of research on a wide range of important topics. This represents a significant program of research and capacity building activities to support access to services and primary prevention. It provides a summary of the currently available evidence on the drivers of family violence experienced by LGBTIO+ communities and recommendations on how to address

These activities, and the many more described in this annual report, are a testament to the talent, hard work, originality and dedication of the Centre's staff. By their dedication they have improved the community's understanding of issues related to



Private Lives 3



In November 2020, ARCSHS released the national report of Private Lives 3: The health and wellbeing of LGBTIQ people in Australia, the largest and longest-running national survey on the health and wellbeing of LGBTIQ people in Australia.

Private Lives 3 is Australia's largest ever national survey of the health and wellbeing of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex and gueer (LGBTIQ) people aged 18 years and older. It is the third iteration in the Private Lives research project series. following the first Private Lives report in 2005 and the Private Lives 2 report in 2012. It provides vital information across numerous life domains to assist health professionals, service providers, community organisations and governments to better understand the health and wellbeing of LGBTIQ people in Australia.

The Private Lives 3 project was conducted by ARCSHS, supported by Rainbow Health Victoria and jointly funded by the Victorian Department of Health and Human Services and the Victorian Department of Premier and Cabinet. Led by Associate Professor Anthony Lyons with co-authors Dr Adam O. Hill, Associate Professor Adam Bourne, Associate Professor Ruth McNair (University of Melbourne) and Marina Carman, the report covers diverse topics such as relationships, families, housing, health, service use, disability, multicultural backgrounds, intimate partner and family violence, community connectedness and more.

The survey was completed by 6,835 people between July and October 2019. Participants from numerous diverse backgrounds completed the survey, including the largest known trans and gender diverse sample. This incredible response is owed to people from all over the country who generously allowed a glimpse into their lives.

The national report, Private Lives 3: The health and wellbeing of LGBTIQ people in Australia, was launched by Victorian Minister for Health and Minister for Equality The Hon. Martin Foley, with presentations from Associate Professor Anthony Lyons and Rainbow Health Victoria Director Marina Carman, and a highly informative and thoughtprovoking discussion panel chaired by Jackson Fairchild of Rainbow Health Victoria, with Associate Professor Ruth McNair (University of Melbourne),

Teddy Cook (Manager, Trans and Gender Diverse Health Equity, ACON) and Simon Ruth (CEO, Thorne Harbour

Pride in **Prevention**

On July 3, Rainbow Health Victoria launched a major evidence guide for the primary prevention of family violence in LGBTIQ communities: <u>Pride in Prevention: A guide to primary prevention of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ communities</u>.

The guide was launched by Gabrielle Williams, Minister for Prevention of Family Violence, and Ro Allen, the Victorian Commissioner for LGBTIQ+ Communities, joined by Russell Vickery, LGBTIQ representative on the Victorian Victim Survivors' Advisory Council.

The launch also featured a panel discussion with project partners Zoe Belle Gender Collective and Thorne Harbour Health, and leaders in the primary prevention of violence against women, Domestic Violence Resource Centre Victoria and Our Watch. Panellists shared their thoughts on the relevance of the resource to their work and its importance in developing a shared vision of ending all forms of family violence.

The guide has been produced by the LGBTIQ Family Violence Prevention Project 2019-2021, a groundbreaking initiative led by Rainbow Health Victoria and funded by the Office for Women in the Victorian Department of Premier and Cabinet.

This project forges new ground in the primary prevention of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ communities, seeking to address critical evidence gaps, strengthen understanding of the drivers of violence, and build expertise for both LGBTIQ organisations and family violence primary prevention organisations to effectively deliver evidence-based programs.

Pride in Prevention summarises the current available evidence on the drivers of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ communities and provides recommendations for priority interventions to address it. The guide will underpin the work of several pilot primary prevention activities to be co-developed and delivered as part of the next phase of this project.













From a distance: Sex and nology during COVID-19

On July 16, ARCSHS presented a seminar in conjunction with the Gender, Sexuality and Human Rights Theme, Transforming Human Societies Research Focus Area in the School of Humanities and Social Sciences, exploring the role of new technologies in shaping human sex and intimacy – issues starkly highlighted during the restrictions on human contact imposed globally in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The seminar considered the ways in which technologies produce human intimacy in sometimes unexpected ways, new ways that people seek intimacy and navigate cultures of sex and intimacy using digital technologies, and how technologies mediate human connection in ways that reform and expand possibilities for sex and intimacy.







Out with Cancer: LGBTI Experiences of Cancer Survivorship and Care

This interdisciplinary project aims to: identify and understand the complex intersection of gender, sexual identity, age and other categories of difference, in relation to the cancer survivorship and care experiences of LGBTI individuals; ascertain barriers and

facilitators to the delivery of culturally competent cancer communication and care to LGBTI patients; and synthesise and implement these findings into tailored support materials for LGBTI survivors and carers, and into Australian LGBTI cancer best practice and policy recommendations. The methodology includes an audit of existing Australian cancer care and communication guidelines and published resources for LGBTI survivors and their carers, interviews with cancer care professionals, and a synthesis of findings to develop evidence-based resources.

Improving Spiritual Health Care for **LGBTQA+ Australians**

This project aims to investigate the history, scale, nature and impact of LGBTQA+ conversion practices and ideology in Australia. This will be done through a series of focus groups and interviews with survivors, advocates, and service providers, as well as a national survey of religious experiences among LGBTQA+ Australians. This data will be used to establish the impacts of conversion practices and develop resources to support improved spiritual care of LGBTQA+ people. The findings will benefit society, supporting social cohesion in the fraught area of religious and LGBTQA+ rights.

Understanding Service Support Needs of LGBTIQ People Experiencing **Family, Domestic and Sexual Violence** (FDSV)

The overarching aim of this project is to inform and improve the capacity of family, domestic and sexual violence service providers to understand and address the needs of LGBTIQ communities. This includes exploring: expert opinion as to how family, domestic and sexual violence services can appropriately support LGBTIQ communities; understanding the needs and experiences of LGBTIQ people accessing such services; and identifying models of good practice across the family violence sector in Australia. The project also includes development of guidance to help enhance LGBTIQ-affirming service provision in the future.

Private Lives 3: A National Study of the Health and Wellbeing of LGBTIQ People Living in Australia

It is the third iteration of the Private Lives series, following Private Lives 2 conducted in 2011 and the original Private Lives project conducted in 2005. The Private Lives 3: The health and wellbeing of LGBTIO people in Australia national report was launched in November 2020.

Writing Themselves In 4: **Understanding the Health and** Wellbeing of LGBTQA+ Young People in Australia

This national study explores the health and wellbeing of LGBTQA+ young people (aged 14 to 21 years) in Australia. This is the fourth iteration of the survey since 1998 and is a vital source of data to inform policies and interventions aimed at this population. The 2019 round of the survey focused on understanding the positive and protective factors in the lives of LGBTQA+ young people, as well as how health disparities are evident among further marginalised communities. Examining Risk and Protective Factors for the Development of Gambling-Related Harms and Problems in Victorian LGBTIQ+ **Communities**

This project examines gambling within Victorian LGBTIQ+ communities. It aims to identify risk and protective factors for the development of gambling-related harms and problems unique to these communities. In addition, we are particularly interested in understanding the degree of problem gambling in the LGBTIQ+ community and exploring the experiences of individuals from each subgroup in this community, as very little research in this area has been done.

The Story of Us: Improving Our **Understanding of the Relationship** between Minority Sexualities and Mental Wellbeing: Bisexual Adults in **Heterosexual Relationships**

La Trobe University Building Healthy Communities Research Focus Area

The Story of Us project focuses on mental health and wellbeing of bisexual people who are currently in a 'heterosexual' relationship. It aims to delve deeper into previous research findings that show bisexual people in intimate relationships with different-sex partners experience poorer mental health. In this project we aim to reconsider and revise the ways in which minority stress theory is applied in research exploring mental health among LGBTQIA+ populations.

Lean on Me: Exploring Peer Support for Mental Health and Suicide Prevention within LGBTIO **Communities**

North West Melbourne Primary Health Network

LGBTIQ communities experience a disproportionate burden of mental ill-health and suicidality. Previous research at ARCSHS has also identified that many LGBTIQ people perceive challenges in accessing mental health services, and instead rely on informal support networks. This project examines the nature of mental health and suicide-prevention-related support provided by peers or community leaders within LGBTIO communities in Melbourne. In doing so, it explores their lived experience of providing this support, and seeks to understand how they can be better supported in their roles, in terms of identifying, responding and referring during times of mental health crisis.

Establishing an International Research Collaboration to Improve Health Outcomes Associated with Cannabis Use among 2SLGBTQ+ Youth

This project, supported by a Canadian Institutes of Health Research planning grant, aims to establish a set of new international interdisciplinary research collaborations, including partners from Canada, United States, United Kingdom and Australia. Together, we will build a new program of research focusing on health outcomes associated with cannabis use among Two-Spirit, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gueer and other sexual and gender minority (2SLGBTQ+) youth (aged under 30 years).

Social responses to HIV and viral hepatitis

Addressing Hepatitis C-Related Legal, **Policy and Practice Discrimination in** a Post-Cure World

This project aims to address the legal and policy dimensions of hepatitis C discrimination. Hepatitis C is a major public health challenge linked to profound discrimination, including in law and policy. Treatments introduced in 2016 improved cure rates; optimism about disease elimination is high, but questions remain about discrimination faced by those who are cured. This interdisciplinary project's goal is to generate new knowledge about hepatitis C discrimination in a post-cure context, and identify opportunities for legal and policy reform. Expected outcomes of the project include better legal, social and policy outcomes for Australians cured of hepatitis C, significantly benefiting these individuals directly and society more broadly. This

project was awarded in 2020 and will commence in 2021.

Lived Experiences of Treatment for Hepatitis C in Australia: An Online Resource for People Considering Treatment, Members of the Public, **Healthcare Workers and Other Professionals**

This project aims to support uptake of new hepatitis C treatments. With the introduction of new treatments in 2016 the Australian Government adopted the WHO's goal of eliminating the disease by 2030. While early treatment rates were high, they have since plateaued, with stigma and poor information considered key obstacles. This project will generate new knowledge on treatment decisions and experiences. using a proven qualitative methodology. In doing so, it will produce a website covering personal experiences of treatment, issues in treatment decision-making, and advice on enhancing life during and after treatment. It will tackle hepatitis Crelated stigma, and inform and benefit potential treatment users, families and relevant professionals.

RISE Study (Recent Diagnosis and the Impact of Support on the Experiences of HIV)

This partnership project, led by the Kirby Institute, brings together researchers with health departments, clinicians and community organisations of all eight Australian jurisdictions, with their diverse characteristics and approaches to optimising the HIV continuum of care. Analysis of an online prospective open cohort of people newly diagnosed with HIV (recruited over three years) will identify predictors of progressing to

each step in the HIV continuum of care. Qualitative interviews will detail perceived norms and the motivations underlying specific patterns of engagement with the continuum of care and methods of sexual risk reduction. In addition, the project involves in-depth qualitative interviews with HIV support program staff to identify how service provision adapts to the changing priorities of clients. This partnership provides new knowledge that can be used to improve the HIV continuum of care.

Reducing Health Disparities for Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Peoples

This project, led by Curtin University, aims to develop a greater intercultural understanding of migrants from sub-Saharan Africa, Southeast Asia and Northeast Asia, and the factors that predict poor health outcomes related to blood-borne viruses and other sexually transmissible infections. Mixed methods will be used to engage a diversity of migrants, and address knowledge gaps, including migrants' understanding of sexual health and disease transmission, risk behaviours, and the sociocultural and structural factors influencing help-seeking behaviours. The availability of population-level data is vital to inform better models of care that reflect the heterogeneity and diverse needs of culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) people. The project will develop a systematic methodology for collecting periodic behavioural surveillance data using culturally appropriate methods. This data will assist in developing culturally responsive health services to meet the needs of CALD people.

Hepatitis C Partnerships: Enabling and Constraining Inter-Organisational **Networks in the Scale-Up of DAA** Treatment

The HIV health service and community sector is responding to unprecedented developments in treatment technologies, and major policy and practice shifts in scaling up directacting antiviral (DAA) treatment among people who inject drugs and other people with hepatitis C virus (HCV). These changes will compel new relationships and adaptations by community, policy, health service and research organisations to optimise the scale-up of DAA treatment access. This project analyses the interorganisational network structure of the organisations responding to HCV in selected jurisdictions across Australia. The analysis will identify characteristics of network structures that either enable or hinder capacity to respond to the rapid changes underway. The results are expected to help guide the HCV response and unlock the potential of the inter-organisational networks to achieve the priorities of the National Hepatits C Strategy. This project will release its final report in 2021, Hepatitis C Partnerships: Enabling and constraining inter-organisational networks in the scale-up of DAA treatment.

HIV Futures

HIV Futures is a series of national surveys of people living with HIV (PLHIV) in Australia that has been repeated periodically since 1997. The survey focuses on the quality of life among PLHIV, including treatment use, relationships, stigma and discrimination. This data provides evidence against which indicators in the Australian National HIV Strategy are measured. HIV Futures 9 was completed in 2019 and data will be collected for HIV Futures 10 in 2021.



W3 Project: Understanding What Works and Why in Peer-Based Health **Promotion Approaches in HIV and** Hepatitis C - Stage 3

The What Works and Why (W3) Project (w3project.org.au) is a groundbreaking study that uses systems thinking to investigate the role of peer-led programs and the influence of these in their community, policy and sector systems. This year, the W3 team began work on Stage 3 of the Project. This stage is a national study of how well peer-led responses achieve and sustain the four W3 Functions - engagement, alignment, adaptation and influence in their work. This stage will pool resources and data from selected peerled responses in multiple states across Australia, with the aim of creating a

consolidated evidence base showing the quality and impact of peer-led HIV and hepatitis C programs. This will support peer-led responses to demonstrate their full impact and value; enhance the implementation, quality and impact of their programs; and respond quickly and confidently to rapid changes in the broader HIV and hepatitis C responses. It will also generate stronger and clearer evidence of what works and why, and provide insights and guidance for the investment and scale-up of peer programs in priority populations. So far, a working group has been established, which includes representatives from partner organisations and government policy makers working in the areas of blood-borne viruses and alcohol and other drugs. Work has also begun on developing indicators.

Understanding Experiences of Telehealth Care Delivery for Hepatitis C Treatment in Australia

This qualitative study investigates consumer and provider perspectives on telehealth for hepatitis C care and treatment during the COVID-19 pandemic to develop new knowledge on the role of telehealth in hepatitis C care delivery more broadly.

HIV Intersections Community of Practice

This project strengthens the work of the HIV Intersections Community of Practice in Victoria, to support agencies and programs to work on HIV and intersecting issues, including (but not limited to) HIV and international mobility, culturally and linguistically diverse communities, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. This includes facilitation of quarterly community of practice learning forums and coordination of the HIV and Intersectionality Symposium.

Blood-Borne Virus (BBV) Sector Development Program: Supporting the HIV and Hepatitis Workforce

The BBV Sector Development Program is a knowledge translation and implementation program that supports the Victorian blood-borne virus health promotion, community health, allied health and policy workforce to respond effectively to HIV, hepatitis B and hepatitis C. The BBV Sector Development Program supports agencies and programs to identify and

engage in the activities that will in turn support the implementation of the Victorian BBV Strategies. The Program works to embed new and existing knowledge into policy and practice, to maximise the impact of ARCSHS' research, and to support and strengthen the HIV and hepatitis partnership response. The BBV Program facilitates several Communities of Practice and working groups, including the BBV Workforce Network and the HIV Intersections Community of Practice. Other activities include hosting two major annual forums in collaboration with research, community and health practitioners, and producing the monthly BBV News bulletin of the latest news, research, resources and upcoming events.

Integrated Hepatitis C Services Re-Orientation Project

In 2018, the Victorian Government Department of Health and Human Services funded ARCSHS' BBV Sector Development Program for three years to develop a framework of contemporary nurse-led models of care, and coordinate a Community of Practice for the 12 funded services. The aim of this project is to align the Integrated Hepatitis C Services with the Victorian Hepatitis C Strategy 2016-2020, with the goal of eliminating hepatitis C as a public health priority.

PLHIV Peer Navigator Implementation Study

ViiV Healthcare United Kingdom

This project aims to identify and articulate the core elements and strategies for the effective implementation and scale-up of an HIV Peer Navigation Program (PNP). The PNP involves trained staff living with HIV who provide peer education and support for people living with HIV in clinical healthcare settings. These staff are employed, trained and managed by Living Positive Victoria and provide the service within partner clinics on an outreach basis. The study will collect data from internal evaluation and monitoring embedded in the peer support service to assess implementation outcomes (such as acceptability, adoption, feasibility,

appropriateness, fidelity, cost, penetration and sustainability) as well as to assess its effectiveness in outcomes such as quality of life, healthcare engagement, resilience, health literacy and treatment attitudes. Data will be collected, through a mix of online surveys, interviews and focus group methods, from clients of the PNP (service evaluation), the peer navigator staff (feedback on the implementation of the program), and from staff at the partner clinics (feedback on the implementation of the program).

PozQoL: Valuing Quality of Life among People with HIV -**Development of a New PozQoL** Website

The PozQoL Scale is an empirically validated quality of life scale for people living with HIV. The scale has been translated from English into 15 languages. A new, user-friendly website (pozgol.org) has been developed to support the international dissemination and accessibility of the PozQoL instrument and its related materials. The website contains specific information about the PozQoL project, as well as general background information about quality of life among PLHIV and the importance of focussing on quality of life when working in clinical and community settings with PLHIV. There are comprehensive instructions on how to use the scale and on calculating, interpreting and using the resulting scores. The site also features a PozQoL Stories section where clinical, peer, and community workers, as well as researchers, can share their experiences and findings from using the PozQoL Scale in their own work. The website launched in January 2021.

Missing Voices: Building HIV Positive Women's Meaningful Engagement with HIV Clinical and Cure Research

This project aims to better understand the barriers and enablers to women's participation in HIV clinical and cure research through exploring the perspectives of Victorian women living with HIV themselves, and clinicians who work with HIV-positive women.

THE INSPIRE PROJECT: Improve, **Nurture and Strengthen Education,** Collaboration, and Communication between PLHIV and Researchers

This project aimed to identify strategies to enhance the meaningful involvement of people living with HIV in HIV-cure-related clinical research. The project involved a workshop with a range of stakeholders across the HIV sector and led to the development of pop-up classes on community engagement for scientists and clinicians working in HIV research, which were delivered at the International AIDS Society meeting in Mexico City 2019. In 2020, the workshop process was written into a set of recommendations for researchers in clinical HIV research.

Evaluation of National Peak Community Organisations (AFAO, NAPWHA and Scarlet Alliance) and their Contribution to the National BBV and STI Strategies

The Australian Research Centre in Sex, Health and Society was commissioned by the Australian Federation of AIDS Organisations (AFAO), the National Association of People with HIV Australia (NAPWHA) and Australian Sex Workers Association (Scarlet Alliance) to evaluate the leadership, coordination and capacity-building role of these peak community-led organisations. The purpose of the evaluation was to examine recent evidence of the overall quality and impact of AFAO, NAPWHA and Scarlet Alliance (independently and collectively) in their unique roles within the national BBV and STI response, and identify gaps, barriers and opportunities for a strengthened national response to BBV and STI.

Asia Pacific Men Who Have Sex with Men (MSM) Internet Survey (APMIS): A Pilot Multi-Country HIV **Surveillance Survey**

La Trobe University Building Healthy Communities Research Focus Area

This pilot project involves establishing the feasibility of implementing a largescale, multi-country online survey of HIV and sexual health among gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men in Asia and the Pacific. The pilot project involves a survey conducted in Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Vietnam and Japan, and examines the likelihood of achieving sufficient scale and diversity of respondents via various recruitment methods. The pilot survey will also capture large-scale data pertaining to the use of new HIV prevention technologies, including pre-exposure prophylaxis, and engagement with HIV treatment services.

Sexual health and wellbeing

The Third Australian Study of Health and Relationships (ASHR3): A **National Representative Sexual Health Survey**

Sexual and reproductive health is fundamental to human happiness and wellbeing and to the fabric of society. Policies and services to support sexual and reproductive health require accurate data on the behaviour, attitudes and sexual health outcomes of the population. These parameters have been measured twice through the Australian Study of Health and Relationships (ASHR), in 2001/2002

and 2012/2013. The third ASHR survey comes at a time of major social, technological and medical changes, many affecting the sexual and reproductive health of Australians. ASHR3 will be a nationally representative survey of over 20,000 Australians aged from 16 to 69 years. The three consecutive ASHR surveys will provide time-trend data over 20 years and up-to-date nationally representative prevalence estimates. The findings will inform health promotion, the education curriculum, clinical and counselling services, and national and state strategies.

Seventh National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual

Commonwealth Government Department of Health

A national survey of the sexual attitudes, knowledge and experiences of Australian adolescents has been carried out approximately every five years since 1992. The seventh survey, to be conducted in 2021, adds to this long-term project, informing policy, program and curriculum development, enabling measurement and reporting on key national strategic indicators related to sexually transmissible infections and blood-borne viruses, and providing ongoing contributions to the scientific literature on the sexual health and wellbeing of young people.

Young People and Sexual Health Information

This study was commissioned by the Commonwealth Department of Health. It seeks to better understand what sources of sexual health information young people access, how they access these sources, why they choose certain sources over others, and how they determine whether or not a source is reliable or trustworthy. The aim of the study aligns with The Fourth National Sexually Transmissible Infections Strategy 2018-2022, which identified the need for initiatives that support sexual health and address stigma affecting health-seeking activity, including among the priority population of young people.

Primary Prevention of Sexual Violence Against Women: Combining Evidence and Practice Knowledge for Policy Reform

This evidence review and service/advocacy sector collaboration is the first stage towards the development of an Australian Government research agenda on the primary prevention of sexual harassment and sexual violence against women. This body of research is specific to the primary prevention of sexual violence, but builds on existing national policy outlined in the Fourth Action Plan (2019-2022) and foundational work by Our Watch, Australia's National Research Organisation for Women's Safety (ANROWS) and VicHealth to monitor and guide practices towards the overall prevention of violence against women and children.

Victoria Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health 2018

Data from the Sixth National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health is being utilised to develop a state-level report for Victoria. Findings will inform sexual health policy and programs, as well as curriculum development at a state level. The full report will be released in 2021.

LifeStyles Sex-Ed

ARCSHS supports the moderation of an educator portal on the LifeStyles website (lifestyles.com.au) to support teachers involved in sexuality education. This project also manages the delivery of sex education resources to thousands of teachers across Australia and develops quarterly newsletters to keep sex education teachers updated on current research, resources and training opportunities. In addition, the project team consulted



with LifeStyles and their partners in 2019 and 2020 on the development of a new evidence-based classroom resource, Sex Edventures - a chooseyour-own-adventure-style video resource and accompanying teacher's guide for classroom use, released through the new LifeStyles educator portal in August 2020.

Improving Prevention of Sexual Assault in Regional Victoria (Industry PhD Project)

Centre Against Sexual Assault, Central Victoria (CASA-CV)

CASA-CV conducts a number of programs related to addressing and preventing sexual assault in the Central Victorian region. This industry PhD will develop the research skills of the candidate (Emily Corbett) to help further the mission of CASA-CV through collaborative research on the unique contexts of rural, regional and remote environments, and how these interact across various systems and subsequently impact on the experiences of survivors of multiple occurrences of sexual assault. Findings will help to inform policy and practice aimed at addressing and preventing sexual assault in the region.

Sex, gender and consumption

Sexuality, Masculinity and Technology: Men and Intimacy in the **Digital Age**

Australian Research Council Discovery Early Career Researcher Award

This project aims to understand young Australian men's experiences of sexual intimacy and technology use, and how those experiences relate to their masculinity and sexual engagement with women. This project will enhance knowledge on the ways young men engage with women and enhance capacity to build community collaboration in working with men on gender equality.

Muscling Up: Australian Men, **Sexualisation and Body Image Enhancement**

Australian Research Council Discovery Project

This study investigates social changes related to men's body modification practices and their meanings, including the ways in which contemporary Australian men's reflections on attractiveness, desirability and sexual performance are entangled with their bodily labours and gendered identities. Using a qualitative approach, including 30 in-depth interviews with men aged 18 to 45, the research has explored questions related to male body image ideals, masculinity and health. Focus groups were also utilised to explore women's perspectives on the increased visibility of male bodies in Australian culture and their interactions with men engaged in related body modification practices. Findings from this study were published in 2020, with further writing up expected to continue.

Understanding the Impediments to **Uptake and Diffusion of Take-Home** Naloxone in Australia

Opioid overdose is a major health and social problem in Australia. Programs exist to provide opioid consumers with 'take-home' naloxone (THN) to reverse overdose, overseas and in all Australian iurisdictions, but uptake in Australia remains inconsistent. This qualitative project investigated impediments to THN uptake. Between 2017 and 2019, interviews were conducted with people who consume opioids in NSW and Victoria (some of whom had experience of using take-home naloxone), and relevant health professionals. These interviews gathered insights into, perspectives on, and experiences of both naloxone itself, and broader issues shaping the uptake and diffusion of take-home naloxone in Australia. The research emphasises that, while participants across all groups viewed take-home naloxone as necessary and effective, it needs to be supported by broader social, institutional and legal shifts. These interviews were used to inform a world-first website on

personal experiences of overdose and THN (OverdoseLifesavers.org).

Understanding Performance and Image-Enhancing Drug Injecting in Australia

Australia is experiencing a rise in the use of performance and imageenhancing drugs (PIEDs). PIED use carries a range of health risks and, because it often involves injecting, the possibility of blood-borne virus transmission, especially hepatitis C. This ARC-funded project investigates the social practices associated with men's use of performance and imageenhancing drugs in Australia. It aims to generate new insights into the experiences of men who consume PIEDs to inform more appropriate and sensitive harm reduction initiatives. engagement strategies and hepatitis C prevention resources.

Analysing Gender in Research and **Policy on Alcohol-Related Violence** among Young People

This project compares the treatment of gender in research and policy addressing alcohol-related violence among young people in Australia, Canada and Sweden. Employing insights from feminist and science and technology studies, it includes analysis of quantitative research and policy texts, and semi-structured interviews with researchers and policy stakeholders exploring the role gender plays in alcohol-related violence. The project will inform the development of more effective and equitable responses to alcohol-related violence among young people in Australia.

Improving Australia's Legal, Policy and Educational Response to the **Technological Transformation of Sex** and Intimacy

This project aims to understand the ways in which new technologies are becoming part of human experiences of sexual desire, intimacy and pleasure, and to enhance knowledge and explore important implications of new digital, mechanical or medical technologies that are transforming the sexual lives of many Australians. The outcomes will be increased understanding of ethical, legal, human rights, safety and health concerns associated with sexualised use of new technologies, and new evidence regarding the use of technologies in the sexual lives of Australians. Recommendations will be made as to how Australian policy. regulatory and educational systems can best respond to these emerging concerns.

A World-First 'Post-Human Rights' Framework for Drug Policy: Improving Social, Economic and Health **Outcomes (commencing January** 2021)

Globally, recognition is growing that common prohibitionist drug policies contribute to drug-related harms and have not succeeded. Identified harms include the current drug overdose crisis in North America and a surge in overdose deaths in Australia, adding new force to calls for urgent reform. Many advocates argue that human rights considerations can inform improvements to drug policy. However, human rights have traditionally been less reliable for those who fail to fit normative ideas of 'the human' (e.g. women, LGBTQI+, people who use drugs). This project seeks to generate new knowledge on whether human rights can indeed guide reform so as to improve social, economic and health outcomes, or if a new 'post-human

rights' framework that takes account of feminist, queer and other critical approaches to human rights is needed. The project will inform Australian legal, policy and practice reforms as well as international efforts to reduce drugrelated harms.

Crystal Methamphetamine Use, Sex and Risk Practice among Gay and **Bisexual Men**

National Health and Medical Research Council Project Grant

This three-year project, based at the Centre for Social Research in Health at UNSW Australia, aims to examine the crystal methamphetamine use and sex practices of gay and bisexual men (GBM), including unsafe sex and the sharing of injecting equipment, and GBM's understanding and use of harm reduction practices in sexual contexts; to understand how GBM perceive and experience the risks and benefits of crystal methamphetamine use, and how these perceptions and experiences influence decisions regarding drug use and sex; and to identify feasible and acceptable harm reduction strategies, including HIV and hepatitis C prevention strategies, for scale-up and use by GBM who use crystal methamphetamine in sexual contexts. The project employs a qualitative methodology, comprising key informant and GBM interviews in four states: New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia (Funding for the latter component has also been received from the Government of Western Australia). During 2020, the project team focused on further writing up.

Assertive Youth Outreach in Australia: A Review of the Peer-Reviewed Literature

Lived Experiences of Alcohol Consumption and Dependence among Clients in South Western Sydney Local Health District

This South Western Sydney Local Health District-funded project will investigate the experiences and motivations of people who continue to drink heavily despite significant health problems or risks. The project will explore how people who experience difficulties associated with alcohol consumption give meaning to their consumption, manage and respond to alcohol dependence and other concurrent health conditions, and how they view and make decisions about accessing treatment for alcohol dependence in South Western Sydney Local Area Health District.

Chemsex Online Survey for Men Who Have Sex with Men in Taiwan (COMeT)

This online survey of men who have sex with men in Taiwan seeks to examine the experience of sexualised drug use (colloquially referred to as 'chemsex'), including if and how men consider their use 'problematic', how they engage with supportive services and systems, and whether they experience harm.

In such an unusual and challenging year, I'm extremely proud of the way that so many people have risen to the challenge and worked hard to provide services and support to meet the needs of LGBTIQ communities in 2020.

At Rainbow Health Victoria, we've pushed ourselves to deliver timely and relevant research, resources, policy advice and advocacy. This has been ever more important considering the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on health and wellbeing across the population, and for LGBTIQ communities specifically. We have argued strongly for the prioritisation of LGBTIQ needs and service responses in

Early on we reviewed and updated all our training programs and offered additional online forums to allow networking and connections across services. We have worked closely with LGBTIQ community-controlled organisations and services, as well as mainstream services in a number of sectors, to adapt and meet community

We were also part of launching the report for Private Lives 3, the largest national survey of LGBTIQ health and wellbeing. Early in 2021, this will be followed by the launch of the first report for Writing Themselves In 4, the largest national survey of young LGBTQA+ people. This research provides vital insights into the good and the bad in LGBTIQ people's lives, and will be key to informing policy and practice for years to come.

Our new information resource series, Research Matters, was launched this year and will continue to deliver accessible and concise summaries of current research relevant to LGBTIQ health and wellbeing. This includes looking at concepts and definitions, as well as research relevant to particular communities or issues within the LGBTIQ 'umbrella'.

This year we have also been working hard on an updated Rainbow Tick guide to LGBTIQ-inclusive practice. This guide will help any organisations considering undertaking Rainbow Tick accreditation, and has been redesigned as a framework and practical guide to action for any organisation at any stage of their journey towards greater LGBTIQ inclusion. The guide will be launched early in 2021.

Thanks to our partners and stakeholders for their engagement - it has made it all worth it.

Research and policy

In 2020, Rainbow Health Victoria has continued to drive reform and innovation in LGBTIQ health and social policy at both the state and federal level, working closely with organisations such as Thorne Harbour Health and Switchboard. Key achievements include significant submissions to the Commonwealth Senate Inquiry into Family, Domestic and Sexual Violence, the Select Committee on COVID-19 to inquire into the Australian Government's response to the COVID-19 pandemic, and the process for the development of the Victorian Government's first LGBTIQ whole-of-government strategy. Rainbow Health Victoria has also played a lead role in advising government on the findings of the Private Lives 3: The health and wellbeing of LGBTIQ people in Australia national report, as well LGBTIQ inclusion in services, mental health, religious freedoms, family violence, sexual assault and women's health.

LGBTIQ-inclusive practice training

In response to the restrictions of COVID-19, the Rainbow Health Victoria team quickly transitioned all of our training offerings to remote and online delivery formats, with great success. We introduced a new flexible learning package - a blended learning model of our online course, Introduction to LGBTIQ-inclusive practice, and a 3-hour interactive webinar, Putting LGBTIQ inclusion into practice. This webinar was delivered to 11 organisations for 14 sessions with 392 learners over 2020. We also delivered our board/executive training, In Living Colour, to organisational leaders. The online version of HOW2 training was delivered to 12 participants from seven organisations. This added to the delivery in early 2020 of 14 face-to-face sessions of our 4-hour introduction to LGBTIQ-inclusive practice course, True Colours, to 492 learners.

Our online asynchronous training was launched late in 2019. Since then, 23 organisations have enrolled a total of 4.236 learners.

Rainbow Network

In 2020, Rainbow Network continued to offer a range of supports and resources to the youth sector, including a calendar of professional learning opportunities for people working with LGBTIQA+ young people, with events focussed on queer, trans and Intersex people of colour, trans and gender diversity, and asexuality. In order to



keep members connected and supported despite COVID-19 restrictions, Rainbow Network sent out 21 newsletters and introduced a new section. Indiaenous Voices, in collaboration with Courtney Hagen, a young, queer, indigenous guest contributor. Josh Muller also hosted the Rainbow Network Community of Practice sessions, involving over 150 participants across nine sessions.

Rainbow Network continues to be an active member of the HEY (Healthy Equal Youth) partnership and coconvener of the HEY Strategic Advisory Group, and provides advocacy and secondary consultation, as well as sharing resources, opportunities, research and current good practice through our social media and website.

This year we received gratitude from many people for the opportunities Rainbow Network provides to connect with peers and continue to develop LGBTIQA+ inclusive practice.

Intimate partner and family violence

Our Intimate Partner and Family Violence team has continued to build on the success of 2019, successfully completing the first 2-year phase of the LGBTIQ Family Violence Sector Capacity-Building Project. Through this project, 2,345 staff from hundreds of family violence organisations received LGBTIQ training designed to support organisations to improve LGBTIQ cultural safety. These included sessions adapted specifically for Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations, run in partnership with the Thorne Harbour Health Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Project. In 2020, 19 family violence services achieved Rainbow Tick accreditation.

In June 2020, Rainbow Health Victoria was awarded funding to continue this project, building the capacity of the mainstream family violence sector to provide safer services for LGBTIO people experiencing family violence.

The LGBTIQ Inclusive Refuge Project has also been completed. Rainbow Health Victoria provided mentoring and training to two refuges who wish to support LGBTIQ victim/survivors of any gender. One of the refuges has now become the first family violence refuge in Victoria to officially welcome GBTQ men who need to flee and hide from family violence.

LGBTIQ Family Violence Prevention Project

In 2020, Rainbow Health Victoria broke new ground in the field of the primary prevention of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ people. This

innovative project focuses on the primary prevention of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ communities.

In July we were excited to launch Pride in Prevention: A guide to primary prevention of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ communities. This groundbreaking new resource summarises the current available evidence on the drivers of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ communities and provides recommendations for priority interventions to address it.

Queer Family Violence Sector Network

The Queer Family Violence Network changed its name and branding in 2020, growing to over 700 members and welcoming over 100 attendees to recent meetings. Shifting online has attracted members from all over the country, meaning that this important work can now be shared across borders. This year, the Network held three events in partnership with other organisations, including Rainbow Door at Switchboard and Rainbow Network. and played a key role supporting the LGBTIQ Family Violence Forum.

Val's LGBTI Ageing and Aged Care

2020 was a big year for Val's. The ageing and aged care sector experienced tremendous upheaval as a result of COVID-19, particularly in Victoria. Throughout, Val's continued to support LGBTI inclusion in ageing and aged care services. This included:

- Shifting training online to provide regular LGBTI ageing and aged care training across the state
- Continuing to deliver a monthly newsletter providing regular updates to the sector
- Co-hosting two regional CHSP (Commonwealth Home Support Programme) forums in March for the southern and eastern regions
- Undertaking interviews with 11 LGBT elders for the National LGBTI Health Alliance for the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety
- Hosting a 4-session online forum designed to provide opportunities for providers to consider a range of strategies in the development and delivery of LGBTI-inclusive care and support

Val's also recently released a LGBTIinclusive practice review tool for services supporting or caring for older people – the *Val's Review Tool*. The tool aims to support ageing and aged care services to become culturally safe and inclusive for older LGBTI people.

In 2020 Val's continued to advocate for reforms in ageing and aged care and provide advice to government by contributing to a submission to the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety, the consultation for the Victorian government's LGBTI whole-of-government strategy, and a range of committees.

Rainbow Tick

Rainbow Health Victoria has continued to partner with accrediting body Quality Innovation Performance to support organisations pursuing Rainbow Tick accreditation. A total of 27 organisations achieved Rainbow Tick accreditation in 2020. We also experienced the highest-ever number of registrations and enquiries about Rainbow Tick.

Over 2020, we updated the Rainbow Tick guide to LGBTIQ-inclusive practice to meet current needs. The new version of the guide provides a framework and practical guide to action for any organisation at any stage of their journey towards greater LGBTIQ inclusion, and remains a key support for any organisation considering undertaking Rainbow Tick accreditation. The new guide will be launched early in 2021.

Rainbow Health Victoria also initiated the Rainbow Tick Community of Practice in 2020, to support and connect those working to develop LGBTIQ-safe and welcoming services. Using the Rainbow Tick standards as a framework to guide best practice, the group is open to people from any organisation, at any point in a journey towards LGBTIQ inclusion.

Through its work, the program aims to create safe and inclusive aged care and health services that recognise and value older LGBTI people.

LGBTIQ Family Violence Sector Capacity-Building Project

Rainbow Health Victoria is funded by Family Safety Victoria (FSV) to provide a range of capacity-building initiatives to enable the family violence sector across Victoria to provide safe services for people with diverse sexualities and genders. The first phase of this project consisted of capacity building through the rollout of the HOW2 training program to 133 specialist family violence services across Victoria, delivery of all-staff professional

development training for specialist family violence services, and an evaluation of the efficacy of the above whole-sector LGBTIQ-inclusive practice interventions. Intensive support was also provided to two family violence refuge sites to become LGBTIQ inclusive, using a mentoring approach. The project also supports the Queer Family Violence Sector Network. The next phase of this project will run from 2020 to 2022.

LGBTIQ Family Violence Prevention Project

The HEY Project consists of a consortium of 10 place-based and seven statewide partners, including Rainbow Health Victoria and Rainbow Network. HEY partners provide peer support, referral, and support to LGBTIQA+ young people and their families, as well as education and advocacy, with the overall aim of improving the mental health and wellbeing of young LGBTIQA+ young people in Victoria. The role of Rainbow Health Victoria within the partnership is to provide strategic advice, evidence


and support to the Victorian Government, Youth Affairs Council of Victoria (YACVic) and HEY partners. HEY is managed by YACVic.

Rainbow Tick

Licensing agreement with Quality Innovation Performance (QIP)

Rainbow Tick is a quality framework that helps organisations show that they are safe, inclusive and affirming services and employers for members of the LGBTIQ communities. The Rainbow Tick standards, owned and developed by Rainbow Health Victoria, are designed to build lasting LGBTIQ inclusion. Accreditation is provided by an independent assessor, Quality Innovation Performance. Rainbow Tick can also be used by any organisation at any stage to develop plans to improve LGBTIQ inclusion for consumers, staff and volunteers.



Teaching and higher degree research programs

The ARCSHS Higher Degree Research (HDR) program celebrated several successes in 2020. Students gave more than 20 presentations at conferences and other academic forums, and published more than 15 papers and book chapters. Many students also presented their work at the monthly ARCSHS Learning Forums.

At the start of the year, we had 12 students. During the year, Andrew Westle, Paulina Ezer and Michael McDermott were awarded their PhDs; Dr McDermott was also awarded the Nancy Millis Award for theses of exceptional merit. In 2020, we also welcomed three new students: Lily Moor, Emily Corbett and Rebecca Cavarra, all on scholarships. By the end of the year, we had 12 active students at various stages of preparing research proposals, collecting data and writing their theses. So far, we have also made offers to three potential new students for 2021.

We are particularly proud of the tenacity and perseverance that our HDR students demonstrated in view of the dramatic shifts in study and research conditions throughout 2020. Roz Bellamy took an active role in the University response to assist HDR students in managing through the pandemic and extended lockdown.

Postgraduate supervisors contribute their time and expertise to work with students on their studies. Supervisors work in teams, with at least one principal supervisor and one co-supervisor for each student, as well as a panel of two or three other academic staff members who meet once a year to monitor each student's progress.

Undergraduate teaching program: Contemporary Issues in Sex and Sexuality

ARCSHS has been teaching this undergraduate subject since 2011. In 2020, we had 56 students enrolled in the unit. This subject was designed as an online unit, although we had adopted a blended model in recent years to include two face-to-face seminars during the semester. Due to COVID-19, we reverted to a fully online model.

Drawing on critical sexuality studies, the subject introduces students to a range of issues related to sex and sexuality in contemporary Australia, including debates regarding sexuality education, sexual health and sexual rights. The unit draws on a wide range of sources, including media, web-based material and theory from the social sciences and health, to help students examine and reassess the range of meanings, values, assumptions and expectations embedded in social understandings of sex and sexuality.

Graduate Certificate in Sex, Health and Society

In 2020, we commenced teaching the Graduate Certificate in Sex, Health and Society. This one-year part-time course comprises four subjects:

Semester 2, 2020

- Principles of Human Sexuality
- Research in Sex, Sexuality and Sexual Health

Semester 1, 2021

- Sex, Sexuality and Sexual Health: Communication, Policy and Practice
- Sexual Bodies, Identities and Marginalisation

Drawing on the latest research on sex, sexuality and health, the course aims to help students develop a multidisciplinary knowledge of human sexuality and its role in health and society. Students also discover how to create innovative programs and influence policies to improve the wellbeing of all communities.

There were 16 students enrolled across the two subjects offered in the course in 2020. Three of these students took one of the subjects as an elective while enrolled in the Masters of Public Health. while the rest were enrolled in the Graduate Certificate in Sex, Health and Society and will continue on to complete the Certificate in 2021. Students came from a range of backgrounds, including nursing and midwifery, community development, counselling and the arts. Many students told us that they enrolled in the course to expand their knowledge with a view to moving into professional areas, such as sex education or women's health. Other students enrolled in the course as a way to step back into further study while exploring an area of interest.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the course was taught entirely online, involving a mix of Zoom workshops and webinars. Students provided positive feedback on this teaching style and enjoyed the weekly discussions.



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
