

Increasing citation rates and research visibility, preserving research outputs for the future and enabling easier collaboration are some of the benefits to researchers from the University's digital repository, La Trobe Research Online.

Research online to you, open to the world!

Research Online stores and disseminates scholarly materials by La Trobe University authors. It is an invaluable resource for promoting the work of La Trobe University staff and postgraduate students to a global audience and it supports the University's eResearch initiatives.

Currently, Research Online contains records describing more than 24,000 research works (journal articles, conference papers, books, book chapters), representing La Trobe University's published research output since about 2000.

More than 1,000 of the works currently recorded in Research Online have a full-text, Open Access copy of the publication available, and are available for immediate viewing or download.

All citation data feeds through into Research Online from Research Master as an ongoing process. Full-text of any publications will appear in Research Online if the research is published in an Open Access journal, or if the publisher has granted permission.

Publishers may allow release of the published, submitted or accepted manuscript for inclusion in Research Online.

"We prefer authors to provide either the submitted or accepted manuscript to Research Online as soon as possible after completion," said Michael Wood, Manager Digital Infrastructure in the Library.

"This means that when publisher permission is obtained, Research Online can have the full text ready for release."

New facilities at Albury-Wodonga

Students asked for more group study spaces and the Library listened! A new group study area has been created at the Albury-Wodonga campus where groups of students can gather to work collaboratively without disturbing others at the computer workstations. The room is powered for laptop use and filled with natural light.

Over the summer break, the Library also added two outdoor tables and chairs (close enough for wireless access), upgraded existing Group Study Rooms to include large LCD screens for collaborative work and added 15 laptop lockers.

ICT have also upgraded the video-conferencing equipment in the Library Conference Room, a making this room an ideal venue for meetings and presentations.



Two Librarians share role at Shepparton

Students and staff have two Librarians to speak to at Shepparton now that the role of Campus Librarian is being shared between Donna Wileman and Iris Ambrose. Iris is in the library every morning while Donna works the first half of the week. Both Librarians are very flexible and are willing to rearrange things to attend tutorials or workshops.

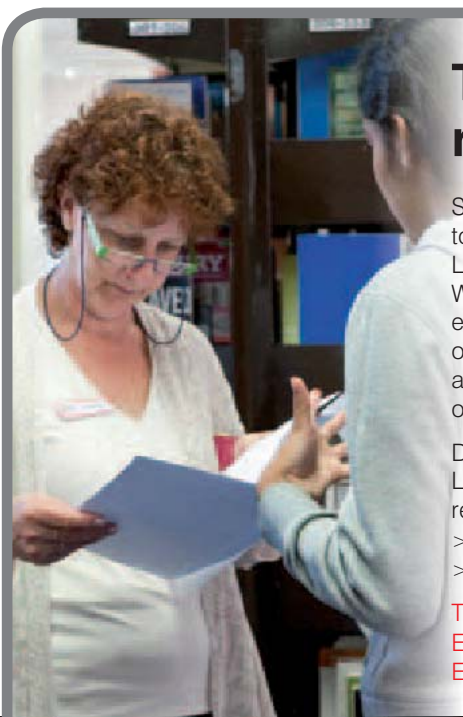
Donna and Iris are located in the La Trobe Library office in the GOTAFE Library and have responsibility for the following Faculties:

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New private study spaces for researchers

In February the new Academic Study and the Postgraduate Study were opened on Level 2 of the Library at the Melbourne campus. These dedicated facilities were planned as part of the major redevelopment completed in 2010 and are open to all academic staff and postgraduate research students.

Card swipe access has been enabled so that all academics and higher degree by research students (including those from regional campuses) can swipe to gain access to these facilities.

The Postgraduate Study has nine PCs at workstations and study carrels as well as casual seating. The Academic Study has a meeting room, couches and a desk with a desktop PC. Both rooms have internal phones and wireless access. Both areas have access to a kitchen area.

These facilities can be used during normal Library opening hours.

Through these discussions Library staff gained some valuable insights into tutors' perspectives on teaching, learning and Library services.

University Librarian awarded ALIA Fellowship

In recognition of the significant and valuable contribution made to the library and information services profession in Australia, the University Librarian, Professor Ainslie Dewe, has been awarded the distinction of Fellow of the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA).

Professor Dewe's Fellowship was presented at the April 2011 meeting of the Council of Australian University Librarians (CAUL) by Graham Black, ALIA President (pictured right).

The following information is from by Sue Hutley, Executive Director, ALIA.

'Prior to taking up the appointment as University Librarian at La Trobe University in 2008, Ainslie was University Librarian and Director of Knowledge Management at Auckland University of Technology for six years and from 1997 to 2002 Director of RMIT University Library in Melbourne.

Ainslie has been a member of the Council of Australian University Librarians (CAUL) from 1997 to 2002 and again from 2008. Ainslie was a member of the CAUL Statistics Focus Group from 1997 to 2002 and chaired this Group between 1999 to 2001. As Chair, Ainslie worked to enable the collection of accurate, relevant and authoritative data to inform the management of Australian and New Zealand university libraries and promoted methodology for valuing the economic costs and benefits of libraries developed with Coopers and Lybrand. Since her return to Australia in 2008, Ainslie has been a member of the CAUL Executive Committee and



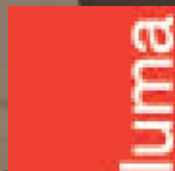
is currently Deputy President. She was also a member of the CAUL Library Staff Development Conference 2010 Committee.

Ainslie was a significant contributor to CAUL's submission to DEEWR's inquiry into An Indicator Framework for High Education Performance Funding in 2010 and represented CAUL at the Productivity Commission Roundtable on parallel importation of books in April 2009. She represented CAUL at the Senate Employment, Workplace Relations, Small Business and Education Reference Committee

hearing into the capacity of public universities to meet Australia's higher education needs in 2001, the inaugural Tertiary Education Associations Forum in 2009 and at Exploring Education Possibilities: Emerging Technologies and the National Broadband in 2009.

Ainslie has represented Australia and New Zealand on the International Association of Technological University Libraries (IATUL) Board since 2006 and is the current Board President. She also convened the IATUL conference Digital Discovery: Strategies and Solutions held at Auckland University of Technology in New Zealand.'

Library's first art installation

Artist in residence, Gosia Wlodarczak, created many curious stares and answered many questions from students and staff when she created a drawing on glass in the Library at the Melbourne campus over four days in March.

Wlodarczak, whose work can be described as a combination of portraiture, collaboration and performance, appeared in the Library as part of a LUMA (La Trobe University Museum of Art) program. She is well known both nationally and internationally for her drawing projects which literally entail the artist drawing everything which enters her line of sight; she describes her work on her website as "a registry of the everyday."

The drawing, which Wlodarczak worked on continuously for each four hour session, recorded momentary views – each time she moved her head or repositioned her body, the view changed, and so did the drawing. The end result is a combination of fleeting, abstracted impressions and more sustained and recognisable studies of the objects and people surrounding her.

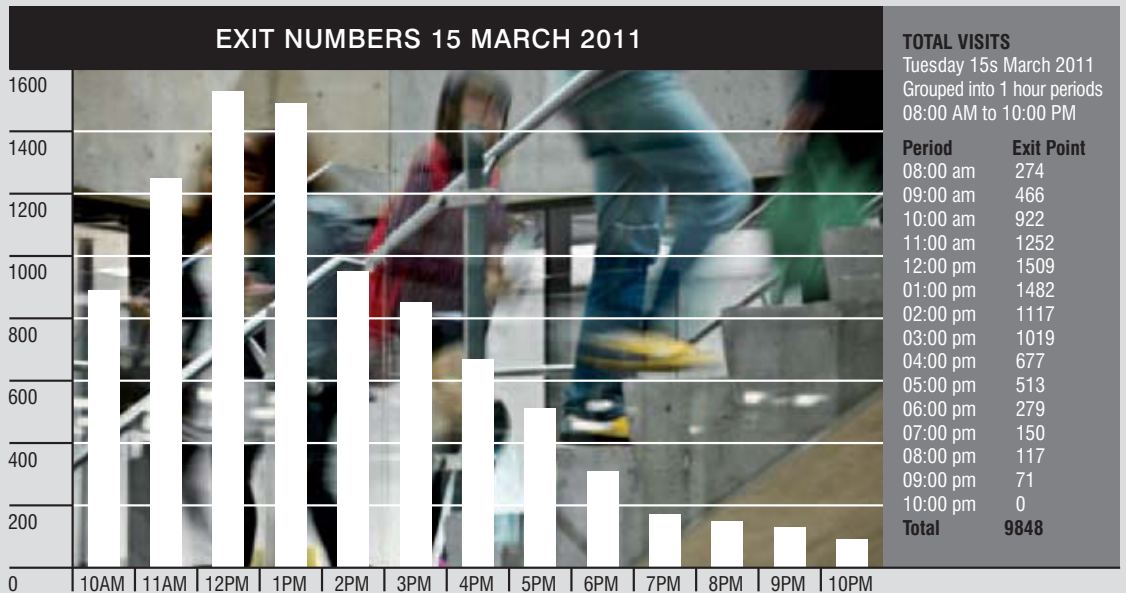
Come and see the drawing in stair 02 on Level 2 and see if you can identify anyone you know!

It's a busy place!

The refurbished Library at the Melbourne campus now has nearly 2000 study seats/spaces. However, there were 9848 visitors to the Library throughout the day on Tuesday 15 March.



Library becomes a 24 hour operation

In a trial that will run during semester and exam periods in 2011, Level 1 of the Library is now open all night Monday to Thursday and until midnight on Fridays.

Feedback from library users in the 2010 client satisfaction survey, the need to meet current and future demand and benchmarking with other university libraries are some of the reasons that lead the Library to make a case for funding of more than 2,000 additional hours of opening in 2011.

"The University invested \$10 million renovating the Library in 2010 to become a state-of-the-art technology-enabled learning space," said Professor Ainslie Dewe, University Librarian.

"We need to ensure we deliver value for this investment to our organisation and our clients. It is also an increasingly common practice in Australian and international academic libraries."

The 2010 Library renovation at the Melbourne campus was designed to allow access to the ground floor of the Library to be restricted for the purpose of extended hours. It now operates as a study hall with a limited service available via the Reserve Inquiries desk until midnight, after which time a security guard is on duty.

The extended hours are additional opening hours for the Library, not additional hours for current staff.

How it works

Once normal operating hours finish after 10pm Monday to Thursday and after 6pm Fridays, everyone is asked to leave the Library building and students or staff who want to re-enter must swipe their student staff card to enter. This is a safety and security measure as staff and students must first register online with security before their cards will work for swipe entry to the Library.

Throughout the extended hours students can access printers, computers, and study booths for collaborative work. However, there is no access to study rooms or collections on other levels or to library service desk assistance.

The Library also extended its summer hours so that in January and February the Library was open each day of the week at 8 am and closed at 7 pm except for Friday when it closed at 6 pm. The Library was also open over summer on Sundays from 11am to 5 pm.

The Heyward Library at the Bendigo campus also implemented extended weekend opening hours in 2010.

Embedding Library services in LMS increases use

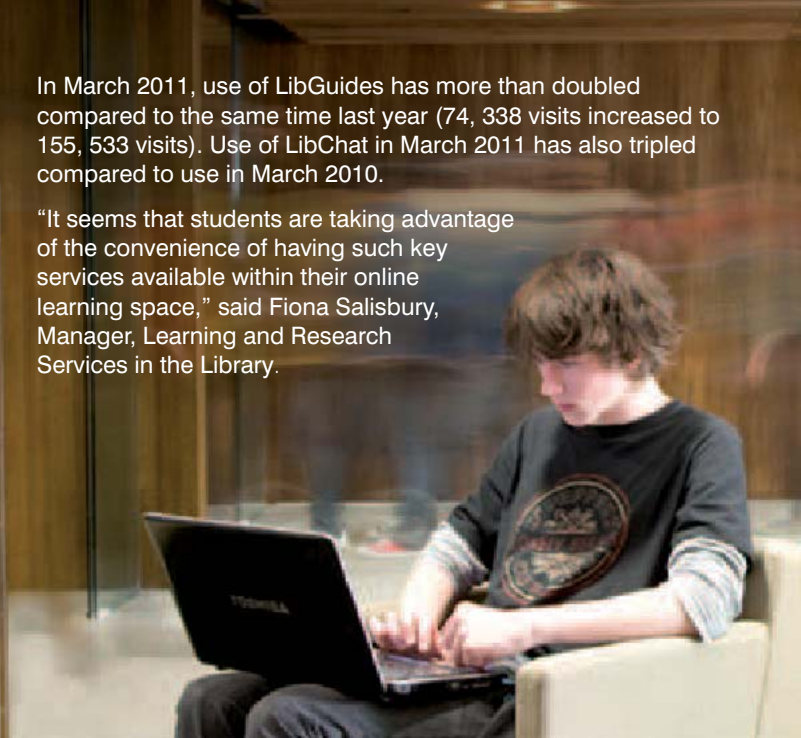
Making information resources available to students at the point-of-need has been a long term goal for the Library. In 2010, with the first year of operation of the new Learning Management System based on Moodle, this goal has been achieved via Library 'sticky blocks' embedded in to the system.

The first block contains links to Reserve and eReserve lists for individual subjects as well as links to the specific LibGuide (Library subject guide) and LibChat (online live quick query service).

The second contains a search box, links to the Library homepage, LibAnswers (Library FAQs) and LibSkills (self-paced online library research training modules) as well as View/Renew my loans.

In March 2011, use of LibGuides has more than doubled compared to the same time last year (74, 338 visits increased to 155, 533 visits). Use of LibChat in March 2011 has also tripled compared to use in March 2010.

"It seems that students are taking advantage of the convenience of having such key services available within their online learning space," said Fiona Salisbury, Manager, Learning and Research Services in the Library.



New referencing resources popular with students

New online resources that have been developed to help students with citing and referencing their sources of information are proving to be very popular with these pages often sitting near the top of the most visited pages on the Library website.

The Academic Referencing Module (ARM) includes an online tutorial for each style of referencing, including the four most commonly used referencing styles used in first year at La Trobe, and cover the principles of referencing, why and when you need to reference, how to cite and quote material and how to compile a reference list in a given style.

The Academic Referencing Tool (ART) complements the tutorial for a given style. It is a tool box which provides detailed examples of in-text referencing, direct quotations, paraphrasing and footnoting. It includes Bibliography examples for a variety of material such as books, journal articles, newspaper articles, and other resources.

Inquiry/Research self-check quiz

Students at the University come from diverse backgrounds and not everyone has had an equal opportunity to prepare for university study. In order to succeed in their studies, students need information skills to search for, evaluate and use relevant and appropriate scholarly references in their academic work.

The Inquiry/Research Self Check online quiz developed by the Library is designed to increase student awareness of the essential information skills needed for starting research at university. It enables students to assess their level of understanding of key academic concepts and skills that are assumed at first year university level, giving them an idea of the skills they already have, and those they need to develop.

There are 10 questions with video feedback for every question. Each question assesses an intended learning outcome in the Information Literacy Framework (lib.latrobe.edu.au/about/infolit). For students who answer incorrectly the feedback links to online modules which help them to gain a clearer picture of what they need to know.

The Inquiry/Research Self Check is embedded in selected cornerstone subjects in each Faculty. It is an important first step in building the information research skills students need for university study.

The skills students are introduced to in the Inquiry/Research Self Check are subsequently reinforced and rehearsed in assignments and other course activities. Library training sessions and guides also give students an extra opportunity to practice and build these skills to the required level during their course.
