Keynote Speakers



KEYNOTE DAY 1

Georgina Beyer

Politician and human rights advocate and world's first openly transgender mayor and member of Parliament in New Zealand

Georgina Beyer the world's first openly transgender mayor, as well as the world's first openly transgender Member of Parliament.

Georgina was born in Wellington and raised in Taranaki by her Grandparents until age 4½. She returned to Wellington for school and later moved to Auckland with her family.

Georgina has acted in film, television, theatre and cabaret with major acting highlights including Close to Home, Inside Straight, Shark in the Park, and Shortland Street. She has also worked in broadcasting.

In 1999 Georgina became a Member of Parliament for Wairarapa and prior to this role she was Mayor of Carterton, having been elected in 1995 with a 48% majority and re-elected in 1998 with a 90% majority. She reluctantly resigned as Mayor in March 2000 due to her parliamentary workload.

Georgina resigned from Parliament in February 2007 after serving more than seven years as an MP. Achieving everything she set out to do, including ensuring the survival and strengthening of Masterton's hospital, bringing government services back to heartland Wairarapa and the passing of the Prostitution Reform and Civil Unions Acts, has meant that she can now look for fresh challenges.

She currently works as a speaker and LGTBQ+ advocate. Georgina shares aspects of her life including her experience as the world's first trans-sexual mayor and MP, life on the streets as a sex worker, her near-death duel with end-stage renal failure and her kidney transplant. In 2018 Georgina was invited to speak at the Oxford Union.

Georgina has authored a book, 'Change for the Better' which was published in October 1999 by Random House.



KEYNOTE DAY 2

Ita Buttrose AC, OBE

Ita Buttrose AC, OBE has had a long interest in health and ageing issues and is one of Australia's busiest health advocates. She currently chairs the Advisory Board of The Australian Mental Health Prize. Her other commitments include serving as National Ambassador of Dementia Australia having been National President from 2011-14; patron of the Macular Disease Foundation, Emeritus Director of Arthritis Australia, an organisation she chaired from 2003-2006 and patron of the Jodi Lee Foundation for Bowel Cancer Awareness.

Earlier this year Ita was appointed Chair of the Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC) and in this year's Queens's Birthday Honours was made a Companion of the Order of Australia (AC) for eminent service to

the community through leadership in the media, the arts and the health sector, and as a role model.

She was the 2013 Australian of the Year and has had a distinguished media career. She created the ground-breaking Cleo magazine, was the youngest ever editor of The Australian Women's Weekly, the first woman to ever edit an Australian metropolitan newspaper in Australia as Editor-in-Chief of the Sydney Daily & Sunday Telegraphs, and the first woman director of News Limited Australia.

She chaired the National Advisory Committee on AIDS (NACAIDS) from 1984-88. Her committee spearheaded Australia's national HIV/AIDS education program. She later chaired the AIDS Trust of Australia from 1990-94.

In 2014 Sydney's Macquarie University conferred an Honorary Doctor of Letters on Ita in recognition of her contribution to the arts. In 2015, she was conferred an Honorary Doctor of Letters by the University of Wollongong for her contribution to mental health and ageing. In 2018 Ita was conferred Doctor of the University - Honorary Medicine Doctorate by University of New South Wales for eminent service to health and for being an inspirational role model for aspiring women in business and those wanting to make a difference in society.

She has written 11 very successful books including Eating for Eye Health – The Macular Degeneration Cookbook which she co-authored with Sydney chef, Vanessa Jones.

Tristan Meecham

DIRECTOR, ALL THE OUEENS MEN

Tristan Meecham is an artist and performer who champions social justice and equality, celebrating communities through socially engaged frameworks, contemporary arts and creative action. Together with Bec Reid, Tristan is the Director of All The Queens Men. Tristan has become a leading creative voice within the LGBTI+ community nationally and internationally, specifically for championing the rights of LGBTI+ older people. Through a relational

engagement practice, he co-designs creative projects that enable communities improved access, not only to arts experiences, but broader community health and social services

Recent LGBTI creative projects include: The Coming Back Out Ball, a spectacular social event celebrating Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Intersex (LGBTI+) elders; LGBTI+ Elders Dance Club, a free monthly social event for rainbow communities; Toy, a gender neutral workshop where children build toys of their dreams.



Hon Luke Donnellan MP

VICTORIAN MINISTER FOR CHILD PROTECTION; MINISTER FOR DISABILITY, AGEING AND CARERS

Luke Donnellan is Minister for Child Protection, Disability, Ageing and Carers in the Victorian Labor Government led by Premier Daniel Andrews. Luke was elected as the State Member for Narre Warren North in November 2002.

He was born in Melbourne and attended Xavier College 1977 – 1984. He received a Bachelor of Commerce from the University of Melbourne in 1987.

After finishing university, he worked as a commercial real estate agent, financial planner and client services manager.



Ro Allen

VICTORIAN COMMISSIONER FOR GENDER AND SEXUALITY

Ro is Victoria's first Gender and Sexuality Commissioner. Ro has over 20 year's experience in community services, governance, social justice and LGBTI advocacy. Ro was the former Chair of the Victorian Adult, Community and Further Education Board and a commissioner on the Victorian Skills Commission.

As founding CEO of UnitingCare Cutting Edge, Ro established Victoria's first rural support group for LGBTI young people and a state wide network facilitated through the Youth Affairs Council of Victoria for training and worker support.

Ro is the former Deputy Chair of the Hume Regional Development Australia Committee and former Chair of Communities for Children in Shepparton. Ro was appointed to the first Victorian LGBTI Ministerial Advisory Committee in 2001, chaired the second and served on the third Committee concluding in 2014. Ro was a member and later co-chaired the National Working Party for LGBTI Social Reform established from 2011 to 2013.

Ro is a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors and was recognised for community service in receiving a Centenary Medal in 2003. In 2009, Ro was inducted into the Victorian Government Honour Role for Women.



Senator The Hon Richard Colbeck

MINISTER FOR AGED CARE AND SENIOR AUSTRALIANS, MINISTER FOR YOUTH AND SPORT

Richard Colbeck is a Liberal Senator for Tasmania and the Minister for Aged Care and Senior Australians and the Minister for Youth and Sport.

Prior to entering politics in 2002, Senator Colbeck worked in the construction industry for more than two decades, starting as an apprentice and going on to own his own business.

He served as an Alderman on the Devonport City Council, a Director of the Tasmanian Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and President of the Devonport Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

Richard has served as Minister for Tourism and International Education, Minister Assisting the Minister for Trade and Investment, Assistant Minister for Agriculture and Water Resources, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Finance and twice as Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture.

He also held Shadow Parliamentary Secretary roles in the Health, Industry and Innovation, and Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Portfolios.



TRANS WOMAN EXTRAORDINAIRE, WHOSE AMAZING LIFE AND BUSINESS WAS SHARED IN THE AWARD-WINNING BOOK, THE TRAUMA CLEANER Sandra Pankhurst is truly label-defying. A transgender woman, Sandra Pankhurst has lived many lives, rising above adversity. Her remarkable life is the subject of the internationally acclaimed, multi-award-winning book 'The Trauma Cleaner' (Text Publishing).

Sandra (then "Peter") was adopted into an abusive family, relegated to a backyard bungalow, malnourished, excluded from family life and escaped home in his teens.

Marrying young, he soon realised it was not possible to continue his life as a husband and father – so he left that life to become Sandra -- drag queen, sex worker and a gender reassignment patient in the early 80s. Sandra got on with her life. With an enviable work ethic, she went on to become Australia's first female funeral director, a trophy wife and a local government candidate.

Sandra Pankhurst is now CEO of one of Australia's most successful trauma cleaning businesses, transforming the filth and squalor of murder, suicide, drug dens, crime, mental illness with nononsense practicality and genuine compassion in equal doses. Sandra has the ability to connect to people in difficult situations, in trauma. She has a unique ability to treat her clients with unpatronising dignity and respect, transforming properties back to their former glory.

Sandra is an active advocate for aged care rights, disability, mental health and ethics, and aims to make a positive impact on the welfare of people of all lifestyles in the aged care and mental health sector. She has a unique and engaging presence and her incredible story reminds us there can be an after, survival and a next chapter.

"Becoming Colleen: Finding the Shoe that Fits" is a documentary about an 85 year old transgender woman, transitioning from male to female in the conservative coastal community of Coffs Harbour on the NSW mid-north coast. Having lived most of her life as Colin – a husband, father, policeman,



projectionist and self-declared shoe fetishist, Colleen negotiates her gender transition later in life. Soon after taking those first steps to live openly as a transwoman, Colleen has to move into full-time residential aged care, and like many older LGBT&I people, Colleen is apprehensive and fearful.

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
