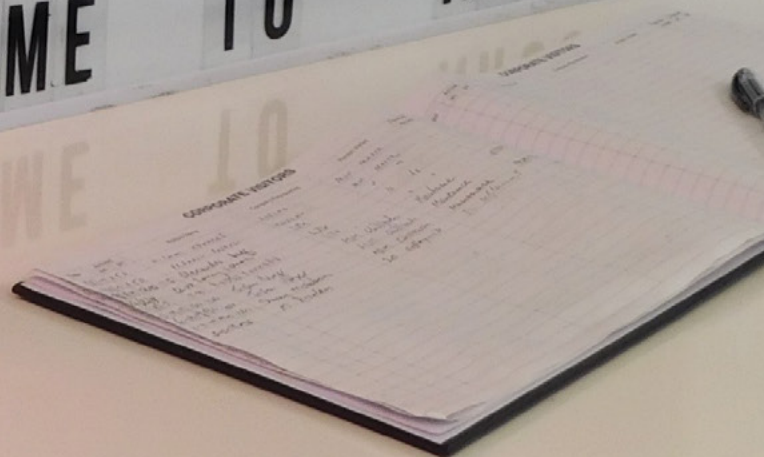

BBV and STI Strategic Directions Network

To inform our social research in blood-borne viruses (BBVs) and sexually transmissible infections (STIs), and in line with the 2016-2019 ARCSHS Strategic Plan, we established a BBV and STI Strategic Directions Network.

The role of the network is to focus on broad strategic directions and priorities regarding BBV and STI research at ARCSHS. Membership of the network includes a cross-section of stakeholders engaged with policy, programs, community and research related to BBVs and STIs.

To remain flexible and responsive, and to maximise input while minimising the burden on members, the network operates as a network of strategic advisors, rather than a committee that meets at set times during the year. ARCSHS facilitates the network and liaises with members of the network throughout the year. This is supplemented by drawing together selected members for topic-specific discussions when required.

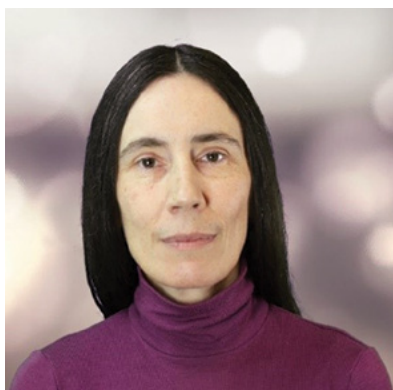

Director's report



This year's Director's report is my first for ARCSHS. I joined the Centre in July 2019 along with a team of researchers, and have spent the months since then getting to know ARCSHS' wonderful staff and impressive range of projects and other activities.

For me, the move to ARCSHS has been a real pleasure, not least because of the warm welcome I've received from staff, students and our community partners. Of course, the achievements described in this report owe much to ARCSHS' former Director, Professor Jayne Lucke, whose contribution I wish to acknowledge at the outset.

On taking up my role as Director of ARCSHS, several new staff members came with me: Professor David Moore, Dr Adrian Farrugia, Dr Renae Fomiatti and Dr Duane Duncan, as well as two PhD students, Nyssa Ferguson and Gemma Nourse. In 2019 we also expanded the ARCSHS Strategic and Scientific Advisory Committee membership with three new members: Professor Mark Stoové (Burnet Institute), Associate Professor Kate Seear (Monash Law School) and Ms Nicky Bath (National LGBTI Health Alliance). I thank them for agreeing to join our committee, and I also thank the existing members for their support throughout

the year. Other new staff members in 2019 were Stephanie Amir, Dr Joel Anderson, Nicole Eckersley, Jackson Fairchild, Dr Claire Farrugia, Dr Adam Hill, Dr Alexandra James, Shamini Joseph and Dr Sylvia Kauer. We also welcomed three new higher degree by research students and celebrated four graduations. Congratulations to Dr William Mude, Dr Julia Taylor, Dr Daniel Du Plooy and Dr Tomas Rozbroj, all of whom were awarded PhDs.

The year has been marked by a range of highly successful events and other achievements. Dr Graham Brown was promoted to Associate Professor, and Dr Andrea Waling was awarded a prestigious Australian Research Council (ARC) Discovery Early Career Research Fellowship. The ARC also awarded ARCSHS staff two Discovery Projects in the 2020 round; ARCSHS-based chief investigators were Professor David Moore, Dr Adrian Farrugia and myself.

Our busy events calendar included a range of seminars, with presentations from overseas guests Dr Eric Walsh-Buhi (San Diego State University) and Dr Phillip W. Schnarrs (University of Texas, Austin) and many others. We also heard from a panel of experts who kindly took part in the November ARCSHS Oration event, for which I delivered a lecture to introduce myself to the Centre, the University and the broader community. Concerned with increasingly highly charged questions about fact, truth and the responsibilities of researchers whose work aims to offer reliable knowledge for the public good, the Oration invited the panellists, Emeritus Professor Gary Dowsett, University of NSW Scientia Professor Carla Treloar, and University of Sydney Professor of Gender Studies Kane Race, to reflect on research practice and ethics in an uncertain world. Their remarks were highly stimulating, and can still be heard by going to our events page online.

Other areas of positive growth and transformation include ARCSHS' re-design and re-launch of Gay and Lesbian Health Victoria (GLHV) as Rainbow Health Victoria. The launch event was a great success, and we are grateful to Victorian Commissioner for Gender and Sexuality Ro Allen for helping us celebrate our freshly conceived organisation.

Our staff and students have also presented their work at conferences and meetings across the world, as well as engaging actively and collaboratively in community and health sector events throughout the year. Our presentations can be found at the back of this Annual Report, along with our publications, reports and other activities. As you will see, we've had a very productive year.

Lastly, while the COVID-19 pandemic emerged after the 2019 period covered by this report, it seems important to acknowledge its profound impact on ARCSHS, the university sector and the community as a whole. There's much that could be said about these events, and much remaining to unfold. For now, I wish only to pay tribute to ARCSHS' staff for their resourcefulness and endurance in dealing with the upheaval the pandemic has caused so far.

In closing, I wish to thank my ARCSHS colleagues sincerely for the support they've given me since my first days at the Centre in July 2019. Their generosity, optimism and wisdom have been indispensable, and while I still have much to learn, I feel confident I have a fantastic team around me to help me do so. My job now is to give back as much as I've been given, and I look forward to having the chance to do so.

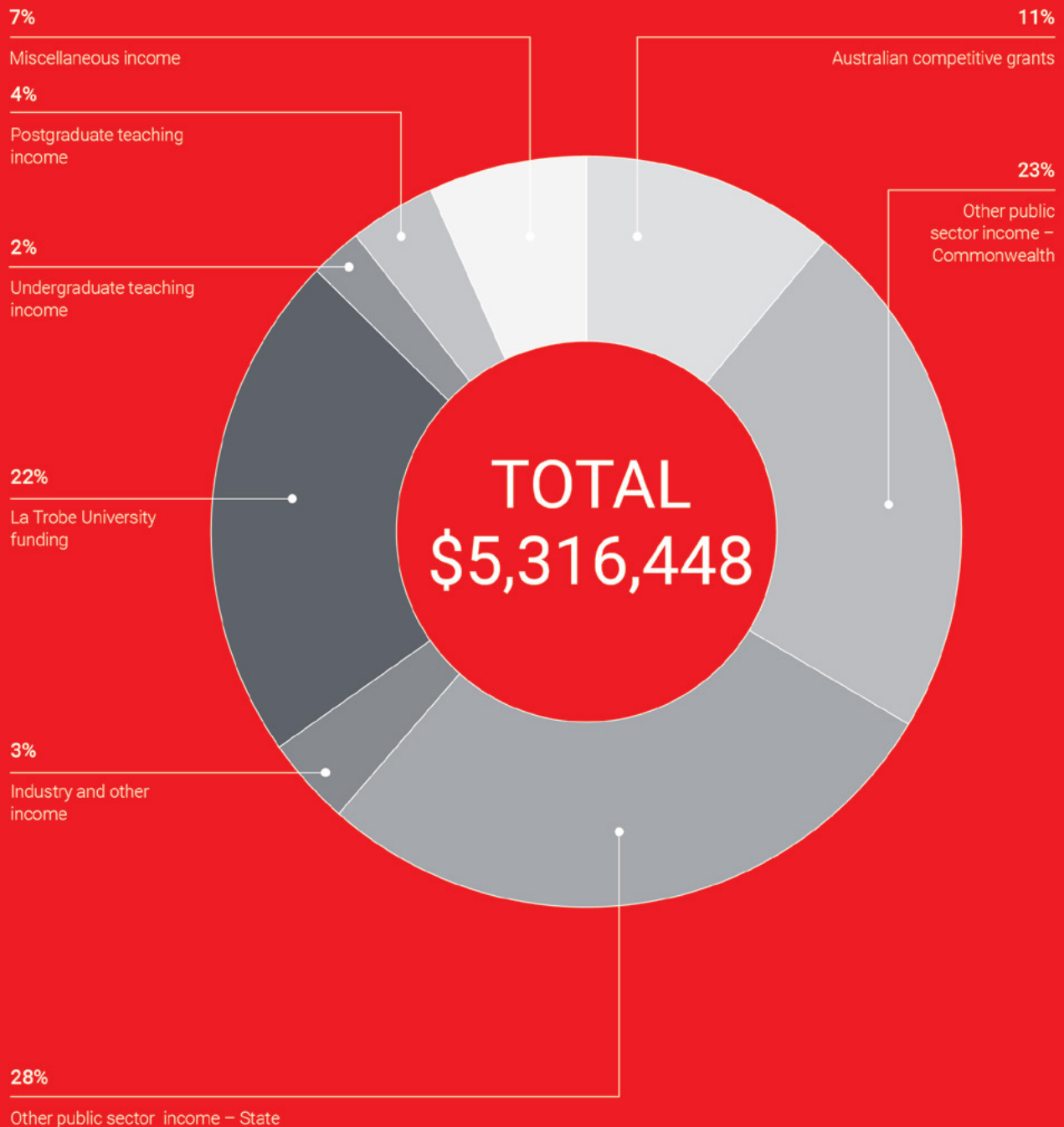

Summary of funding sources



Strategic plan

During 2019, a new Strategic Plan 2020-2023 was developed. This key public document sets out ARCSHS' mission, strategic direction, aims and expectations of performance.

ARCSHS' mission, as stated in the plan, is as follows:

The Australian Research Centre in Sex, Health and Society (ARCSHS) conducts world-class research and education on the social dimensions of sexuality, gender, health and human relationships. It works collaboratively with other researchers, communities, community-based organisations, government and professionals to advance knowledge and promote positive change in policy, practice and people's lives.

The plan includes the following three aims:

1. Advance new knowledge and learning
2. Maximise research impact
3. Enhance capacity for world-class research

The Centre has adopted actions towards achieving each of these aims and has outlined measures to track performance over time. The Strategic Plan will be reviewed annually with input from all staff to track progress against key performance indicators and to revise plans for the coming year. A new Strategic Plan will be prepared in 2023.

Research Expertise

Founded in 1993, ARCSHS plays a leading role in framing the agenda on, and building the knowledge to understand, sex and sexuality in contemporary Australia, particularly as they relate to health, education and social justice.

ARCSHS is the largest research centre in Australia investigating the health and wellbeing for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex and queer (LGBTIQ) communities. This includes a focus on young people, older people, and the intersection of sexuality and gender with other issues, such as disability, family violence and mental health.

The Centre has particular expertise in theorising gender and sexuality, and in investigating their role in health and human relationships. More recently, the Centre has expanded its areas of interest to focus also on the relationship between gender and sexuality and issues of consumption such as alcohol and other drug use, and internet and social media use.

ARCSHS is one of four national centres funded to undertake strategic research as part of Australia's national response to HIV, viral hepatitis and sexually transmissible infections (STIs). The Centre's research directly informs the implementation of these strategies through investigating the lived experience of priority populations, and informing interventions and service system design.

The Centre uses a multidisciplinary approach, bringing together staff with backgrounds in sociology, psychology, public health, anthropology, cultural studies, history, gender and sexuality studies, education, political science and community education. Our unique expertise in community-engaged research allows us to work effectively and in innovative ways with marginalised and difficult-to-reach communities, using a partnership approach.

In addition, the Centre specialises in using research findings to produce highly valued training and educational resources for community, services and practitioners. In a range of ways, we work in partnership with government, service providers and community organisations to advance policy and practice to achieve better outcomes.

ARCSHS also has a long-standing and successful higher degree research program. This program focuses on equipping future generations of researchers in areas relevant to the Centre's mission. ARCSHS additionally offers an undergraduate subject within La Trobe University, and is expanding our teaching program in the field of sexuality studies.

Research Themes

Over the next three years, ARCSHS will consolidate and develop its research activities under the following research themes:

1. LGBTIQ health and wellbeing
2. Social responses to HIV and viral hepatitis
3. Sexual health and wellbeing
4. Sex, gender and consumption

International collaboration will be a central priority across all themes. For ARCSHS, this encompasses working with international academic collaborators, conducting research projects involving communities located overseas, addressing global and regional issues, and providing technical advice through relationships with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, and international bodies such as the World Health Organization and the Joint United Nations Programme of HIV/AIDS.

Fifth National LGBT&I Ageing and Aged Care Conference

In October 2019, Val's LGBTI Ageing and Aged Care, the ageing and aged care program of Rainbow Health Victoria, presented the National LGBT&I Ageing and Aged Care Conference, with the theme 'Ageing with Pride: The New Landscape of Ageing and Aged Care in Australia.' The conference, with over 220 delegates, was co-hosted in partnership with the National LGBTI Health Alliance Silver Rainbow program.

The aim of the conference has always been to inspire change and improve and promote healthy ageing pathways for older LGBTI people, people living with HIV, or LGBTI people with a disability, and their carers. Held over two days, the conference continued its established commitment to the principles of social justice, diversity and inclusion. The 2019 program also addressed current reforms and changes occurring in the aged care sector, particularly in relation to LGBTI ageing and aged care. Throughout 2019, the aged care sector was under national focus and scrutiny with the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety. There was also a range of new sector systems and processes introduced, including the New Aged Care Quality Standards, the Charter of Rights and the National Aged Care Diversity Framework and associated LGBTI Action Plan.

The conference program highlighted the changing landscape of LGBTI ageing and aged care in Australia from the perspective of the sector, policymakers, advocates, academics and providers. As with the previous three conferences, the voices of older LGBTI people, people living with HIV, and LGBTI people with a disability, and their carers, were also again central to the program. This provided delegates with the opportunity to hear directly from individuals regarding their experiences, ideas, hopes, fears, and visions of what ageing with pride is to them, and what they need and want with regard to LGBTI inclusive care and support as they age.

The program provided a mix of presentations, workshops, plenary sessions, films and more. The inspirational mood of the conference was established in the opening plenary by the first distinguished keynote address, Georgina Beyer from New Zealand – politician, human rights advocate and the world's first openly trans mayor and parliamentarian – who was utterly captivating. Equally inspiring was the day two keynote address by Ita Buttrose AC, OBE, Chair of the Australian Broadcasting Corporation and an Australian icon who has significantly contributed to many areas of public health, including her early leadership chairing the National Advisory Committee on AIDS in the 1980s, and her ongoing leadership in the dementia, ageing and aged care space.

Other program highlights included:

- Papers on leading research in the area of LGBTI ageing and aged care in Australia, including many contributions from ARCSHS
- A video address from performer, activist and Val's patron, Noel Tovey AM
- Presentations and panels with older LGBTI people, people living with HIV and LGBTI people with a disability sharing their stories and experiences

- Presentations from Ro Allen, Victorian Commissioner for Gender and Sexuality; Sandra Pankhurst, Trauma Cleaner; and Tristan Meecham, All the Queens Men
- Film screenings of *The Coming Back Out Ball Movie* and *Becoming Colleen*
- Contributions from Rainbow Tick-accredited organisations and leaders in LGBTI service delivery.

The conference would not have been the success it was without the hard work of the committee and the generous support of sponsors. This ensured the conference was again able to support widespread participation by older LGBTI people, people living with HIV, and LGBTI people with a disability, at no cost to them. We were thrilled that the majority of the sponsors were Rainbow Tick-accredited organisations with an outstanding commitment to LGBTI ageing, aged care and health, including Lifeview Residential Care and BreastScreen Victoria. Other major sponsors included Dementia Australia, Seniors Rights Service (NSW), Living Positive Victoria and Hammond Care Dementia Support Australia.

In 2019, Val's celebrated a decade of working to improve the health, wellbeing and visibility of older LGBTI people. Throughout those ten years, Val's has contributed to significant change and reform in the aged care sector, and the conference has always been a platform for education and inspiring leadership and innovation in the development and delivery of LGBTI safe and inclusive services. The 2019 conference was Val's final national conference coordination, as we now send it out to the rest of Australia under the leadership of the National LGBTI Health Alliance Silver Rainbow Program. It was a fitting way to celebrate a decade of achievement.





Fifth Contemporary Drug Problems Conference

The fifth biennial Contemporary Drug Problems (CDP) conference, co-organised by staff at ARCSHS, was held in Prato, Italy, from September 4-6, 2019, at the Monash University Prato Centre. Prato provided a beautiful location for almost 100 delegates from 15 countries to engage with the conference theme, 'Rethinking "change": New theories, new topics, new questions, new methods.'

Conference delegates presented new and exciting research, demonstrating innovative approaches to thinking about drug consumption and drug effects. ARCSHS was well represented by staff from ARCSHS' Drugs, Gender and Sexuality (DruGS) program. Director and Professor Suzanne Fraser, Professor David Moore, Dr Adrian Farrugia, Dr Renae Fomiatti, Dr Duane Duncan and PhD student Gemma Nourse each presented exciting and innovative analyses from several ARC-funded projects on men's use of performance and image-enhancing drugs, the uptake of take-home naloxone, and alcohol policy and research.

Some key concerns across the mix of papers included how to challenge dominant approaches to studying drugs, which constitute consumption as necessarily a problem to be fixed; the benefits of noticing instances of care, pleasure, agency and transformation that emerge from drug events; developing and applying new theoretical approaches that help to locate and elucidate gender and its effects in drug consumption practices and policies; and finally, what the above changes in approach might offer for the politics of drugs research, policy, service and advocacy.

Conference attendees also enjoyed three thought-provoking keynote addresses across the three days. The first keynote address, by Associate Professor Kate Seear from Monash University, was based on material from her recently published book, *Law, Drugs and the Making of Addiction: Just Habits* (Routledge, 2019). Seear expertly illustrated legal processes through which lawyers – anticipating what judges want to hear – strategically deploy familiar accounts of drugs and addiction in order to produce optimal outcomes for their clients.

On day two, Associate Professor Natasha Martin, from the School of Medicine at the University of California San Diego, examined the relationship between statistical modelling and the hepatitis C virus global elimination campaign. As these models have become more sophisticated, Martin argued they have been instrumental in communicating the efficacy and affordability of treatment to governments reluctant to support it for stigmatised populations.

Closing the conference, Dr Fay Dennis from Goldsmiths, University of London reflected on the conference theme by critiquing the expectation that it is drug consumers who must change. In thinking about what it might mean to 'live well with drugs', Dennis asked the question, 'How can drug treatments slow down and become more "response-able" to drug consumers?'

In addition to scholarly research, Peer Organisation Participation Awards supported two peer delegates – from the Kirketon Road Centre in Sydney, and from Students for Sensible Drug Policy Australia – to attend and present at the conference. These awards are offered by the CDP conference committee to acknowledge the significant contribution made by peer organisations to drug research, policy and advocacy.

The conference was hosted by the Law Faculty at Monash University, the National Drug Research Institute (Curtin University), the Australian Research Centre in Sex, Health and Society (La Trobe University), the Centre for Alcohol and Drug Research (Aarhus University), the Behaviours and Health Risks Program (Burnet Institute), and the Department of Science and Technology Studies (Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute). The work of the conference organising committee, which included Professor David Moore (CDP editor), Professor Suzanne Fraser (CDP associate editor) and Gemma Nourse (CDP editorial assistant), ensured the success of the event. This included a busy social calendar for delegates, which comprised several opportunities to meet and socialise with colleagues and friends from across the globe, and savour the local food and wine of Tuscany.

A forthcoming special issue of CDP will provide an opportunity to read more about some of the exciting research presented at the conference. The critical drugs research community looks forward to the next CDP conference in 2021.

Out with Cancer: LGBTI Experiences of Cancer Survivorship and Care

This interdisciplinary project aims to: identify and understand the complex intersection of gender, sexual identity, age and other categories of difference, in relation to the cancer survivorship and care experiences of LGBTI individuals; ascertain barriers and facilitators to the delivery of culturally competent cancer communication and care to LGBTI patients through an audit of guidelines and resources and via the perspective of service providers; and synthesise and implement these findings into tailored support materials for LGBTI survivors and carers, and into Australian LGBTI cancer best practice and policy recommendations. The methodology includes an audit of existing Australian cancer care and communication guidelines and published resources for LGBTI survivors and their carers, interviews with cancer care professionals to examine the barriers to and facilitators of culturally competent LGBTI cancer care and communication, and a synthesis of findings to develop evidence-based resources.

Private Lives 3: A National Study of the Health and Wellbeing of LGBTIQ People Living in Australia

It is the third iteration of the Private Lives series, following Private Lives 2 conducted in 2011 and the original Private Lives project conducted in 2005.

This is the fourth iteration of the survey since 1998 and is a vital source of data to inform policies and interventions aimed at this population. The 2019 round of the survey has a focus on understanding the positive and protective factors in the lives of LGBTIQ young people, as well as how health disparities are evident among further marginalised communities.

Developing an LGBTI-Safe Housing Network to Prevent Homelessness and Build Social Connection and Resilience

The Story of Us: Improving Our Understanding of the Relationship between Minority Sexualities and Mental Wellbeing: Bisexual Adults in Heterosexual Relationships

The Story of Us project seeks to explore the mental health and wellbeing of bisexual people currently in 'heterosexual' relationships. It aims to delve deeper into previous research findings that show bisexual people in intimate relationships with different-sex partners experience poorer mental health. This undermines the commonly held assumption that bisexual people in heterosexual relationships experience a form of 'heterosexual privilege' and therefore should experience better mental health than those in same-sex relationships as their experiences of 'minority stress' should, theoretically, be less.

This partnership project, led by the Kirby Institute, brings together researchers with health departments, clinicians and community organisations of all eight Australian jurisdictions, with their diverse characteristics and approaches to optimising the HIV continuum of care. Analysis of an online prospective open cohort of people newly diagnosed with HIV (recruited over three years) will identify predictors of progressing to each step in the HIV continuum of care. Qualitative interviews will detail perceived norms and the motivations underlying specific patterns of engagement with the continuum of care and methods of sexual risk reduction. In addition, the project involves in-depth qualitative interviews with HIV support program staff to identify how service provision adapts to the changing priorities for clients. This partnership provides new knowledge that can be used to improve the HIV continuum of care.

Reducing Health Disparities for Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Peoples

This project, led by Curtin University, aims to develop a greater intercultural understanding of migrants from sub-Saharan Africa, Southeast Asia and Northeast Asia, and the factors that predict poor health outcomes related to blood-borne viruses and other sexually transmissible infections. Mixed methods will be used to engage a diversity of migrants, and address knowledge gaps, including migrants' understanding of sexual health and disease transmission, risk behaviours, and the sociocultural and structural factors influencing help-seeking behaviours. The availability of population-level data is vital to inform better models of care that reflect the heterogeneity and diverse needs of culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) people. The project will develop a systematic methodology for collecting periodic behavioural surveillance data using culturally appropriate methods. These data will assist in developing culturally responsive health services to meet the needs of CALD people.

Hepatitis C Partnerships: Enabling and Constraining Inter-Organisational Networks in the Scale-Up of DAA Treatment

The HIV health service and community sector is responding to unprecedented developments in treatment technologies, and major policy and practice shifts in scaling up direct-acting antiviral (DAA) treatment among people who inject drugs and other people with hepatitis C virus (HCV). These changes will compel new relationships and adaptations by community, policy, health service and research organisations to optimise the scale-up of DAA treatment access. This project analyses the inter-organisational network structure of the organisations responding to HCV in selected jurisdictions across Australia. The analysis will identify characteristics of network structures that either enable or hinder capacity to respond to the rapid changes underway. The results are expected to help guide the HCV response and unlock the potential of the inter-organisational networks to achieve the priorities of the National Strategy.

HIV Futures is a series of national surveys of people living with HIV (PLHIV) in Australia that has been repeated periodically since 1997. These data provide evidence against which indicators in the Australian National HIV Strategy are measured. HIV Futures 9 was completed in 2019.

HIV Testing, Treatment and Care Needs Within Priority CALD Populations

W3 Project: Understanding What Works and Why in Peer Based Health Promotion Approaches in HIV and Hepatitis C

The What Works and Why Project (www.w3project.org.au) is a ground-breaking study that uses systems thinking to investigate the role of peer-led programs and the influence of these in their community, policy and sector systems. Over an 18-month period, the W3 Project collaborated with peer staff at Living Positive Victoria and Harm Reduction Victoria to develop approaches to evaluate peer-based programs at the project and organisational level. Drawing on the W3 Framework for peer-based programs, the project applied the key functions of peer-based programs (Engagement, Alignment, Adaptation and Influence) and took an action research approach to develop quality and impact evaluation tools that are usable, practical and sustainable within the resources of a community organisation. This study developed, trialled and refined 12 quality and impact data collection tools across a range of peer-based programs. These included evaluating: the quality of peer interactions in workshops and one-one peer support; the reach and scope of peer outreach; the impact of programs on quality of life and resilience; the role of partner organisations and services; and collating and translating evolving community trends into persuasive policy and service advice. The W3 Framework has also been applied to identify relevant indicators that align with the contracting requirements of funders.

W3 Peer Insights: Understanding Motivators and Barriers to the Uptake of Hepatitis C Treatments among People Who Inject Drugs

This study investigates the evolving motivators and barriers for people who inject drugs to access hepatitis C treatment and the implications for scaling up health promotion, testing and treatment programs. Utilising the W3 Framework for peer-based programs, the project drew on the expertise and insights of peer staff and volunteers to understand the experiences, perspectives, barriers and enablers for people who inject drugs (PWID) regarding the scale-up and implementation of direct-acting antiviral treatments. In 2019, several focus groups and interviews were conducted in metropolitan and country and regional areas, in partnership with peer-based organisations – Harm Reduction Victoria, NSW Users and AIDS Association, and Peer Based Harm Reduction WA. Short broadsheet reports to facilitate real-time translation of results into ongoing treatment scale-up efforts and practice were produced. Harm reduction and hepatitis C agencies have integrated study findings to strengthen policy advocacy strategies and health promotion interventions to tailor to communities of people who inject drugs.

This includes facilitation of quarterly community of practice learning forums and coordination of a major HIV and Intersectionality Symposium.

Blood-Borne Virus (BBV) Sector Development Program: Supporting the HIV and Hepatitis Workforce

The BBV Sector Development Program is a knowledge translation and implementation program that works to support the Victorian blood-borne virus (BBV) health promotion, community health, allied health and policy workforce to respond effectively to HIV, hepatitis B and hepatitis C. The BBV Sector Development Program supports agencies and programs to identify and engage in the activities that will support the implementation of the Victorian BBV Strategies. The Program works to embed new and existing knowledge into policy and practice, and to maximise the impact of ARCSHS' research. The BBV Program facilitates several Communities of Practices and working groups, including the BBV Workforce Network and the HIV Intersections Community of Practice. Other activities include hosting two major annual forums in collaboration with research, community and health practitioners, and producing the monthly BBV News bulletin of the latest news, research, resources, and upcoming events.

Integrated Hepatitis C Service Reorientation Project

The Integrated Hepatitis C Service Reorientation project is funded for two years (2018-2020) from the Sexual Health and Viral Hepatitis Branch, Victorian Government Department of Health and Human Services. The aims of this project are to increase culturally appropriate pathways and linkages to hepatitis C treatment and care. In collaboration with participating services, a framework and set of guiding principles are being developed to support the re-alignment of these services with the priority actions articulated in the Victorian Hepatitis C Strategy 2016-2020. This will include a shared purpose statement, shared objectives and principles for integrated hepatitis C service delivery in Victoria. The project includes a quarterly Community of Practice meeting for integrated hepatitis C nurses, supporting the development of workplans, and responding to new and emerging research and gaps in treatment access.

W3: Influence of Communities

Drawing on the W3 Project, this study investigated how, when and where gay men are influenced about HIV, and how the work of AIDS councils directly and indirectly supports this learning. It has included a series of seven focus groups and ten interviews from across Australia with gay and bisexual men, as well as staff from AIDS councils and the Australian Federation of AIDS Organisations. The report was completed in 2019.

PLHIV Peer Navigator Implementation Study

This project aims to identify and articulate the core elements and strategies for the effective implementation and scale-up of an HIV Peer Navigation Program (PNP). The PNP involves trained staff living with HIV who provide peer education and support for people living with HIV (PLHIV) in clinical healthcare settings. These staff are employed, trained, and managed by Living Positive Victoria and provide the service within partner clinics on an outreach basis. The study will collect data from internal evaluation and monitoring embedded in the peer support service to assess implementation outcomes (such as acceptability, adoption, feasibility, appropriateness, fidelity, cost, penetration and sustainability) as well as its effectiveness in outcomes such as quality of life, healthcare engagement, resilience, health literacy and treatment attitudes. Data will be collected through a mix of online surveys, interviews and focus group methods from clients of the PNP (service evaluation), the peer navigator staff (feedback on the implementation of the program), and from staff at the partner clinics (feedback on the implementation of the program).

PozQoL Project Stage 3: Implementation Trial of a Quality of Life Measure for People Living with HIV

The PozQoL scale is a validated, short and freely available quality of life measure for people with HIV. The scale was developed for the HIV community, support and healthcare sectors. The PozQoL implementation project aimed to assess the usability, acceptability, and usefulness of the PozQoL scale in the day-to-day work of different health and community services, and to assess how sensitive the PozQoL scale is in measuring changes in health-related quality of life as a result of interventions or services. The study has built on the partnership across research, industry and community to recruit a range of services and programs to conduct the trial, while ensuring the principles of meaningful involvement of people living with HIV are maintained, with peer organisations involved at every stage.



Missing Voices: Building HIV Positive Women's Meaningful Engagement with HIV Clinical and Cure Research

The project 'Missing Voices: Building HIV Positive Women's Meaningful Engagement with HIV Clinical and Cure Research' is a collaboration between Positive Women Victoria and ARCSHS. Little is known about how Australian women living with HIV perceive HIV clinical research, their level of trust in research institutions and researchers, the extent to which they have information about clinical research or their level of clinical literacy, including HIV cure literacy. This project aims to improve understanding of factors likely to be a barrier to women participating in HIV-related clinical research, the reasons why women would be willing to participate in research and strategies for increasing women's engagement with HIV cure and other HIV clinical research.

THE INSPIRE PROJECT: Improve, Nurture and Strengthen Education, Collaboration, and Communication between PLHIV and Researchers

This project aimed to identify strategies to enhance the meaningful involvement of people living with HIV in HIV-cure related clinical research. The project involved a workshop with a range of stakeholders across the HIV sector and led to the development of pop-up classes on community engagement for scientists and clinicians working in HIV research that were delivered at the International AIDS Society meeting in Mexico City 2019.

Chemsex Online Survey for Men Who Have Sex with Men in Taiwan (COMeT)

This online survey of men who have sex with men in Taiwan seeks to examine the experience of sexualised drug use (colloquially referred to as 'chemsex'), including if and how men consider their use 'problematic', how they engage with supportive services and systems, and whether they experience harm.



W3: Understanding Networks in Flux

Advances in prevention and treatment of HIV and hepatitis C (HCV) require major reorientation in roles and relationships among community, health, research and policy organisations. Building on the W3 Project, the Understanding Networks in Flux study is investigating how and why organisation network structures adapt, or remain resistant, to rapid change. Using the Victorian HIV/HCV sector as an exemplar, in 2017/18 we collected baseline data through an online survey and interviews with organisations playing key roles in the Victorian HIV and HCV response. The results were analysed and presented to the Victorian sector in 2019.

Asia Pacific Men Who Have Sex with Men (MSM) Internet Survey (APMIS): A Pilot Multi-Country HIV Surveillance Survey

La Trobe University Building Healthy Communities Research Focus Area

This pilot project involves establishing the feasibility of implementing a large-scale, multi-country online survey of HIV and sexual health among gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men in Asia and the Pacific. The pilot project involves a survey conducted in Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Vietnam and Japan, and examines the likelihood of achieving sufficient scale and diversity of respondents via various recruitment methods. The pilot survey will also capture large-scale data pertaining to the use of new HIV prevention technologies (including pre-exposure prophylaxis) and engagement with HIV treatment services.

Building University-Wide Capacity in Complexity and Systems Science, and Implementation and Improvement Science

This project aims to build two research networks at La Trobe University – the Complexity and Systems Science Research Network and the Implementation and Improvement Science Research Network. These networks will enhance the interdisciplinary research in these areas and strengthen the capacity of research at La Trobe University.

W3: Valuing the Role of the Community Response in HIV: Bangkok Workshop

This project was the first stage in increasing the evidence on the unique role that community and peer-led organisations play in the HIV response in Asia and the Pacific. Drawing on the W3 Project, and in collaboration with the Australian Federation of AIDS Organisations international program, the project hosted a workshop in Bangkok, Thailand with stakeholders from a range of country- and regional-based community organisations in Asia. The workshop identified barriers, enablers and opportunities to increase the visibility and evidence for the role of peer and community organisations, with recommendations for collaborative research and collective evidence-building.

Sexual health and wellbeing

The Third Australian Study of Health and Relationships (ASHR3): A National Representative Sexual Health Survey

Sexual and reproductive health is fundamental to human happiness and wellbeing and to the fabric of society. Policies and services to support sexual and reproductive health require accurate data on the behaviour, attitudes and sexual health outcomes of the population. These parameters have been measured twice through the Australian Study of Health and Relationships (ASHR) in 2001-02 and 2012-13. The proposed third ASHR survey comes at a time of major social, technological and medical change, which affect the sexual and reproductive health of Australians. We propose to conduct the third ASHR in 2021, a nationally representative survey of over 20,000 Australians aged 16-69 years. The three consecutive ASHR surveys will provide time-trend data over 20 years and up-to-date national representative prevalence estimates. The findings will inform health promotion, the education curriculum, clinical and counselling services, and national and state strategies.

National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health: Trends Over Time

The National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health, recently completing its sixth wave of data collection, has consistently surveyed adolescent sexual attitudes, knowledge and experience since 1992. Detailed statistical trend analyses were completed across all waves to identify long-term changes in knowledge, behaviour and attitudes across cohorts of Australian adolescents. The full report was released in 2019.

Sixth National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health

A national survey of the sexual attitudes, knowledge and experiences of Australian adolescents has been carried out approximately every five years since 1992. The sixth survey, conducted in 2018, added to this long-term project, informing policy, program and curriculum development, measurement and reporting on key national strategic indicators related to sexually transmissible infections and blood-borne viruses, and providing ongoing contributions to the scientific literature on the sexual health and wellbeing of young people. The full report was released in 2019.

Young People, Sexual Literacy and Sources of Knowledge: A Review

Commissioned by the Department of Health, this review sought to identify the major influences on the sexual health and wellbeing of young people, the sources of information young people use for their sexual health information and how those sources of information are integrated within the lives of young people.

Western Australia Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health 2018

Data from the Sixth National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health were utilised to develop a state-level report for Western Australia. Findings will inform health policy and programs, as well as curriculum development at a state level. The full report was released in 2019.

ARCSHS supports the moderation of a website to support teachers involved in sexuality education, www.sex-ed.com.au. It also manages the delivery of sex education resources to thousands of teachers across Australia; develops quarterly newsletters to keep sex education teachers updated on current research, resources and training opportunities; and consulted with LifeStyles and their partners in 2019 on the development of a new evidence-based classroom resource to be distributed in 2020.

Systems Approach to Sexual Literacy

La Trobe University Transforming Human Society Research Focus Area

Improving sexual health outcomes across all populations remains an ongoing challenge in Australia and globally. Recent research suggests a need for a systems-based approach to identifying, measuring and developing programs to improve sexual literacy at a population level. This initiative brings together experts across a wide array of disciplines at La Trobe University to develop a collaborative multidisciplinary research agenda to address sexual literacy. Work expanded in 2019 with support from a La Trobe University Research Focus Area grant, which will bring together an international team to conduct mapping research activity in this space and develop new research to address gaps in the field.

Sex, gender and consumption

Muscling up: Australian Men, Sexualisation and Body Image Enhancement

Australian Research Council Discovery Project

This study investigates social changes related to men's body modification practices and their meanings, including the ways in which contemporary Australian men's reflections on attractiveness, desirability and sexual performance are entangled with their bodily labours and gendered identities. Using a qualitative approach, including 30 in-depth interviews with men aged 18-45, the research has explored questions related to male body image ideals, masculinity and health. Focus groups were also utilised to explore women's perspectives on the increased visibility of male bodies in Australian culture and their interactions with men engaged in related body modification practices. The study continued its writing-up stage in 2019.



Understanding the Impediments to Uptake and Diffusion of Take-Home Naloxone in Australia

Opioid overdose is a major health and social problem in Australia. Programs exist to provide opioid consumers with 'take-home' naloxone (THN) to reverse overdose, overseas and in some Australian cities, but uptake in Australia remains minimal. The reasons for this are not well understood. This qualitative project will investigate impediments to THN uptake. It will use interviews collected with opioid consumers, prescribers and pharmacists to better understand THN, and to produce an online resource on personal experiences of overdose and THN. The aim will be to inform those affected by overdose, professionals and the wider Australian community about THN, to support THN distribution, and to thereby save lives and protect communities.

Understanding Performance and Image-Enhancing Drug Injecting in Australia

Australia is experiencing a rise in the use of performance and image-enhancing drugs (PIEDs). PIED use carries a range of health risks and, because it often involves injecting, the possibility of blood-borne virus transmission, especially hepatitis C. This Australian Research Council-funded project investigates the social practices associated with men's use of performance and image-enhancing drugs in Australia. It aims to generate new insights into the experiences of men who consume PIEDs to inform more appropriate and sensitive harm reduction initiatives, engagement strategies and hepatitis C prevention resources.

Analysing Gender in Research and Policy on Alcohol-Related Violence among Young People

This project compares the treatment of gender in research and policy addressing alcohol-related violence among young people in Australia, Canada and Sweden. Employing insights from feminist and science and technology studies, it includes analysis of quantitative research and policy texts, and semi-structured interviews with researchers and policy stakeholders exploring the part gender plays in alcohol-related violence. The project will inform the development of more effective and equitable responses to alcohol-related violence among young people in Australia.

Improving Australia's Legal, Policy and Educational Response to the Technological Transformation of Sex and Intimacy

This project aims to understand the ways in which new technologies are becoming part of human experiences of sexual desire, intimacy and pleasure. The outcome will be increased understanding of ethical, legal, human rights, safety, and health concerns associated with sexualised use of new technologies. Recommendations will be made as to how Australian policy, regulatory and educational systems can best respond to these emerging concerns.

Crystal Methamphetamine Use, Sex and Risk Practice among Gay and Bisexual Men

This three-year project, based at the Centre for Social Research in Health at UNSW Australia, aims to: examine gay and bisexual men's (GBM) crystal methamphetamine use and sex practices, including unsafe sex and the sharing of injecting equipment, and GBM's understanding and use of harm reduction practices in sexual contexts; understand how GBM perceive and experience the risks and benefits of crystal use, and how these perceptions and experiences influence decisions regarding drug use and sex; and identify feasible and acceptable harm reduction strategies, including HIV and hepatitis C prevention strategies, for scale-up and use by GBM who use crystal in sexual contexts. The project employs a qualitative methodology, comprising key informant and GBM interviews in four states: New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia (this last part is funded by the Government of Western Australia). During 2019, the project team focused on further writing up and producing a series of podcasts for the BBV/STI sector on findings related to developing new approaches to health promotion to address crystal use and GBM's health.

Assertive Youth Outreach in SWSLHD: Program and Participant Aims, Priorities and Outcomes, 2018-19

This South Western Sydney Local Health District-funded project will investigate the approaches and priorities underpinning the new Youth Alcohol and Other Drugs Service currently in development at SWSLHD Drug Health Services program. The project will also explore the experiences and priorities of program participants, including how they understand and frame their drug use, and to what extent their perspectives and priorities mesh with the approaches taken by the program. The new knowledge developed in this project will be used to inform the program's aims and practices, identify areas for further consideration, and produce a technical report and peer-reviewed account of the initiative to inform further youth policy and practice in South West Sydney and elsewhere.



Lived Experiences of Alcohol Consumption and Dependence among Clients in South Western Sydney Local Health District

This South Western Sydney Local Health District-funded project will investigate the experiences and motivations of people who continue to drink heavily despite significant health problems or risks. The project will explore how people who experience difficulties associated with alcohol consumption give meaning to their consumption, manage and respond to alcohol dependence and other concurrent health conditions, and how they view and make decisions about, accessing treatment for alcohol dependence in South Western Sydney Local Area Health District.

Lived Experiences of Stigma and Discrimination among SWSLHD DHS Service Users: A Qualitative Study

It is known that stigma is a barrier to healthcare for people with experiences of alcohol and other drug consumption in Australia. In this project we will conduct in-depth interviews with people who have accessed drug health services in South Western Sydney Local Area Health District. We will explore how stigma shapes their engagement with healthcare, their alcohol and other drug consumption, and how they manage and negotiate this stigma. The new knowledge developed in this project will be used to generate innovative strategies to address stigma experienced by people who consume alcohol and other drugs when accessing drug health services in South Western Sydney Local Area Health District.

M3: Media, Masculinities and Mental Health

La Trobe University Building Healthy Communities Research Focus Area

This research project explores young men's sexting practices, in particular the taking of sexy images such as torso and bicep pics, and dick pics. It seeks to explore how men are engaging with their bodies, the kinds of pictures they take, and what they hope such pictures will provide in terms of sexual and romantic interactions with women.

Rainbow Health Victoria

2019 was a big year for Rainbow Health Victoria: our first since embracing a new name and launching a new-look website. These changes reflect our renewed commitment to represent the diversity of the communities we work alongside. Below are some of our highlights from 2019.

Research and Policy

We were very proud to assist in promoting two major ARCSHS surveys of LGBTIQ communities: Private Lives and Writing Themselves In. In 2020, Rainbow Health Victoria will be closely involved in survey analysis and reporting of results for these surveys, to ensure the findings are available to help shape policy, programs and practice.

In 2019, Rainbow Health Victoria has continued to be a leading voice in LGBTIQ health and social policy at both the state and federal level, working closely with organisations such as Thorne Harbour Health and Switchboard. Key achievements include significant submissions to the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System, the Terms of Reference for the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability, and advice to government on housing, religious freedoms, family violence, LGBTIQ family counselling, mental health and intersectionality.

LGBTIQ-inclusive Practice Training

The Rainbow Health Victoria team have delivered a record-breaking number of training and professional learning events over 2019, with 6,000 people participating, from hundreds of different organisations. Across our programs in 2019 we delivered 142 sessions of LGBTIQ-inclusive practice training to 4,750 participants from 110 different organisations. We delivered 10 HOW2 four-day programs to 170 participants in 72 different organisations.

We also hosted 16 full-day issues-based professional development events, designed to increase participant knowledge of different intersections of lived experience or practice – for example, train the trainer events, aged care, youth work, and family violence. In total, over 1,200 participants attended these sessions from hundreds of different organisations.

We were also involved in the development of an online training package with Anglicare. In 2019, this training has been utilised by six organisations, with a total of 3,290 online registrations.

Val's LGBTI Ageing and Aged Care

In 2019 Val's (previously known as Val's Café) turned 10. Val's has contributed to many important reforms in ageing and aged care, including amendments to the federal Aged Care Act recognising the needs of older LGBTI people, and replacing the National LGBTI Ageing and Aged Care Strategy with the Aged Care Diversity Framework and LGBTI Action Plan.

In October, Val's successfully hosted the 4th National LGBT&I Ageing and Aged Care Conference, 'Ageing with Pride', in partnership with the National LGBTI Health Alliance Silver Rainbow Program. Over 200 delegates came together to share information, knowledge and experiences to improve the health, wellbeing, care and visibility of older LGBTI people, people living with HIV, LGBTI people with a disability, and their carers.

Rainbow Network

In 2019, the Rainbow Network launched a new website and hosted nine professional learning events for over 500 participants. Membership of Rainbow Network grew by almost 200 people, and the social media following grew to over 2,000 people across several platforms.

Throughout 2019, Rainbow Network continued to advocate the need for services and spaces that support the health and wellbeing of LGBTIQ+ young people and their families through policy submissions, including to the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System, the National Youth Strategy Consultation, as well as secondary consultation, and representation on various board and advisory groups.

Intimate Partner and Family Violence

In 2019, Rainbow Health Victoria began supporting two refuge sites to become LGBTIQ safe and inclusive, using a mentoring framework. We also started work on a new project in primary prevention, looking at the drivers of LGBTIQ intimate partner and family violence.

The LGBTIQ+ Family Violence Sector Network continued to provide peer support to professionals and link them up with LGBTIQ allies in related sectors. Membership grew to 240 members, representing approximately 100 organisations.

Val's LGBTI Ageing and Aged Care

Val's LGBTI Ageing and Aged Care is a Rainbow Health Victoria program that works to improve healthy ageing pathways, care, and visibility of older LGBTI people. The program works directly with service providers to foster an understanding of the histories and experiences of older LGBTI people, and how these histories and experiences may impact access to support services. Through its work, the program aims to create safe and inclusive aged care and health services that recognise and value older LGBTI people.

Silver Rainbow LGBTI Aged Care Awareness Training

The Commonwealth Government has provided funding for the delivery of national LGBTI aged care training. The training is developed and managed by the National LGBTI Health Alliance and is delivered in Victoria by Rainbow Health Victoria's ageing and aged care program, Val's LGBTI Ageing and Aged Care, as well as by Transgender Victoria, to services across the state that provide care and support to older people.

Domestic and Family Violence Sector, LGBTIQ Capacity-Building Project

Rainbow Health Victoria is funded by Family Safety Victoria (FSV) to provide a range of capacity-building initiatives to enable the family violence sector across Victoria to provide safe services for people with diverse sexualities and genders. The project consists of capacity building through the rollout of the HOW2 training program to 133 specialist family violence services across Victoria, delivery of 'all-staff' professional development training for specialist family violence services, and an evaluation of the efficacy of the above 'whole sector' LGBTIQ-inclusive practice interventions. This project further involves intensive support to two family violence refuge sites to become LGBTIQ inclusive, using a mentoring approach. The project also supports the LGBTIQ+ Family Violence Sector Network. The Network creates resources and facilitates quarterly meetings and regular issues-based professional development seminars on inclusive practice within the family violence sector.

LGBTIQ Family Violence Prevention Project

This innovative project focuses on the primary prevention of family violence experienced by LGBTIQ communities, seeking to address critical evidence gaps, strengthen understanding of the drivers of violence, and build expertise for both LGBTIQ organisations and family violence primary prevention organisations to design and deliver primary prevention activities.

Rainbow Network

Rainbow Network empowers health and human services that work with young people to provide safe, welcoming and inclusive services for young LGBTIQ+ Victorians. Rainbow Network offers: LGBTIQ+ inclusive practice training; resources about LGBTIQ+ inclusive practice; secondary consultation and referral; regular issues-based forums and professional learning opportunities; and a Community of Practice Group. Rainbow Network is delivered in partnership with the Healthy Equal Youth Project, funded by the Victorian Department of Health and Human Services.



Healthy Equal Youth (HEY) Project: A Victorian LGBTIQ+ Youth Suicide Prevention Initiative

The HEY Project consists of a consortium of 10 place-based and seven state-wide partners, including Rainbow Health Victoria and Rainbow Network. HEY partners provide peer support, referral, and support to LGBTIQ+ young people and their families, as well as education and advocacy, with the overall aim to improve the mental health and wellbeing of young LGBTIQ+ young people in Victoria. The role of Rainbow Health Victoria within the partnership is to provide strategic advice, evidence and support to the Victorian Government, Youth Affairs Council of Victoria (YACVic) and HEY partners. HEY is managed by YACVic.

Rainbow Tick

Licensing agreement with Quality Innovation Performance (QIP)

The Rainbow Tick is a quality framework that helps organisations show that they are safe, inclusive and affirming services and employers for members of the LGBTIQ communities. The Rainbow Tick standards, owned and developed by Rainbow Health Victoria, are designed to build lasting LGBTIQ inclusion. Accreditation is provided by an independent assessor, Quality Innovation Performance. Organisations that receive The Rainbow Tick can be listed on the national register of LGBTIQ-accredited organisations. Services can include the six standards as part of their cycle of service accreditation, or can apply to do the Rainbow Tick as a stand-alone assessment subject to ongoing reassessment and quality improvement.

Higher degree research and teaching programs

The ARCSHS Higher Degree Research (HDR) program celebrated several successes in 2019. Students gave 18 presentations at conferences and other academic forums, and published 12 papers and book chapters. Many students also presented their work at the monthly ARCSHS Learning Forums.

At the start of the year, we had 13 students. During the year, William Mude, Julia Taylor, Tomas Rozbroj and Daniel Du Plooy were awarded their PhDs. In 2019, we also welcomed five new students, including two transfers from another institution: Tim Krulic, Nikos Dacanay, Ly Thanh, Gemma Nourse and Nyssa Ferguson. By the end of the year, we had 14 active students who were at various stages of preparing research proposals, collecting data, writing and revising their theses. We had also made offers, with scholarships, to three potential new students for 2020, including two industry-sponsored PhD scholarships with the Burnet Institute and Centre Against Sexual Assault Central Victoria.

Our students were also successful in gaining recognition of their research excellence, including Paulina Ezer and Rosalind Bellamy, who were awarded the Professor Anthony Smith Conference Attendance Award to present their work at an international sexuality conference. Several also engaged in a number of media interviews and community presentations on their work.

Postgraduate supervisors contribute their time and expertise to work with students on their studies. Supervisors work in teams, with at least one principal supervisor and one co-supervisor for each student, as well as a panel of two or three other academic staff members who meet once a year to monitor each student's progress.

Graduate Certificate in Sex, Health and Society

In 2019 the University approved the launch of a new course to be conducted by ARCSHS: the Graduate Certificate in Sex, Health and Society. This qualification, offered from 2020, will provide formal training to professionals and students in sex, sexuality, sexual health and related fields and industries. Blending online modules with face-to-face seminars, this one-year part-time course will comprise four subjects:

- Principles of Human Sexuality
- Research in Sex, Sexuality and Sexual Health
- Sex, Sexuality and Sexual Health: Communication, Policy and Practice
- Sexual Bodies, Identities and Marginalisation

Overseen by Associate Professor Christopher Fisher, the course will begin recruitment for the first cohort in early 2020, with the first offerings occurring in Semester 2, 2020.

Undergraduate Teaching Program: Contemporary Issues in Sex and Sexuality

In Semester 2, 2019, Dr Jennifer Power and Dr Andrea Waling delivered the Centre's undergraduate elective unit, Contemporary Issues in Sex and Sexuality, for the seventh time. The unit is notable for its engaging subject matter, which focuses on a range of issues and debates relating to sexual health, sex and consent, gender politics and sex education. The unit draws on a wide range of sources, including media, web-based material, and theory from the social sciences and health, to help students examine and reassess the range of meanings, values, assumptions and expectations embedded in social understandings of sex and sexuality. The unit is delivered online, and involves live lectures, as well as a set of online learning activities. In 2019, the unit was completed by 50 students from across La Trobe University's campuses.
