BBV and STI Strategic Directions Network (SDN)

To inform our social research in blood borne viruses (BBVs) and sexually transmissible infections (STIs), and in line with the 2016-2019 ARCSHS Strategic Plan, we have established a new BBV and STI Strategic Directions Network (SDN).

Membership of the SDN includes a cross-section of stakeholders engaged with policy, programs, community and research related to BBV and STIs. The role of the SDN is to focus on broad strategic directions and priorities regarding BBV and STI research at ARCSHS.

To remain flexible and responsive, and to maximise input while minimising the burden on members, the SDN operates as a network of strategic advisors rather than a committee that meets at set times during the year. The ARCSHS BBV and STI Research Theme leaders (Dr Graham Brown and Mr Jack Wallace) co-facilitate the network and liaise with members of the SDN throughout the year. This is supplemented by drawing together selected members for topic-specific discussions when required.

The Australian Research Centre in Sex, Health and Society (ARCSHS) is a centre of excellence in multidisciplinary research in sex, gender and sexuality, delivering evidence-based teaching, training and workforce development, which translates research into high-impact, life-changing programs. We seek to contribute to evidence-based, positive, public discussion of sex and sexuality; to acceptance of gender equality and diverse sexualities; to inclusive and appropriate service delivery; and to government policy that supports healthy sex, sexuality and relationships.

We were thrilled this year to announce the appointment of the Honourable Justice Michael Kirby AC as a Distinguished Visiting Professor and Ambassador for ARCSHS. In a year that has raised many global challenges for human rights, Justice Kirby's appointment has been very significant. The impact and importance of ARCSHS research has been spectacularly demonstrated this year as the Safe Schools Coalition received ongoing public and media attention. ARCSHS has been proud to run Safe Schools Coalition Victoria on behalf of the Victorian Government and we were delighted that Roz Ward received the MCV People's Choice Award at the 2016 GLOBE Community Awards in recognition of her achievements.

One of the many highlights of the year was the release of findings from HIV Futures 8 – our national survey of the health and wellbeing of people living with HIV, which has been conducted every two-to-three years since 1997. We were particularly thrilled to receive confirmation of funding from the Commonwealth

Department of Health to extend our work in blood borne viruses, viral hepatitis, and sexually transmissible infections, and to conduct HIV Futures 9 – marking over 20 years of funding for this important and unique study.

I would like to especially thank Professor John Dewar, La Trobe's Vice-Chancellor, for the unwavering support he has given ARCSHS over the last year, and for the University's significant investment in new academic positions and support to enhance our capacity to contribute to advancing knowledge in important areas of research in sex, health and society.

I would like to thank all of you – our supporters, partners and friends – for your encouragement and assistance this year. To all the ARCSHS staff and students, thank you for your hard work, your dedication, passion and everything you do to make ARCSHS the special place it is. As we move into 2017 – our 25th year – we can be very proud of the achievements of the past. We are also able to look forward to an exciting future as a Centre that is undeniably addressing the important and pressing issues of the day – and most importantly, making a real impact by changing people's lives for the better.

Message from Justice Michael Kirby

I congratulate the Australian Research Centre in Sex, Health and Society on its work over the past year.

The struggle to spread enlightenment and knowledge about the role of sex in a healthy society is an ongoing one. There is something about the topic that makes a lot of people intensely nervous, fearful, hostile and ashamed. In part, these feelings may come from aspects of their own upbringing or personal experiences. In part, they may come from religious or cultural instruction. In part, they may come from disappointing encounters with sex or bad health experiences. There are doubtless many explanations. The experience of humanity over the last century has been that the road of wisdom runs through pathways of empirical research. Only when beliefs, fears and intuition are measured against the standards of empirical knowledge can public policy be placed on a sound foundation.

This is where the work of the Australian Research Centre in Sex, Health and Society comes in. It is why I am proud to be an Ambassador to support its mission and to promote the methodology of empirical research in this field. I know from my own early life of the burdens that are cast upon innocent people by ignorant and unscientific attitudes. An important step to changing this feature of humanity was the research of Alfred Kinsey at Indiana University in the United States of America in the 1940s and 1950s. His empirical research into the sexual behaviour of human beings helped to demolish a great deal of hostility based on ignorance; yet the hostility remains today in Australia and the world.

In the year past, Australia has witnessed hostility towards its LGBTIQ minority. This has been evident in the delay in Parliamentary consideration of proposed legislation to remove discrimination in the matter of legal relationship recognition (as 23 other countries have done). It has also witnessed anger and bullying in opposition to the introduction of educational courses in schools to help reduce the toll of prejudice and discrimination against young people on the grounds of their sexual orientation or gender identity. Sadly, recent months have seen suicides amongst Australian school students because of bullying at school. What should be a nurturing and safe environment is turned into one of hostility and danger. Sound research will help us to overcome these obstacles. Education will protect the human rights of every schoolchild.

Also in the year past, the international community had to face a test. The Human Rights Council of the United Nations in Geneva established a mandate for an Independent Expert on Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity. However, a group of nations has attempted to stop action on that resolution. In November 2016, a vote in the United Nations General Assembly rejected the proposed stop order. But it was a close-run thing. The vote was 84 countries for the continuance of the mandate; 77 against; and 17 abstentions. Further attempts may be taken to pursue this hostility. This is all the more surprising because the main focus of the mandate is to address violence against LGBTIQ people globally. How can such violence not be the proper subject of investigation, report and action?

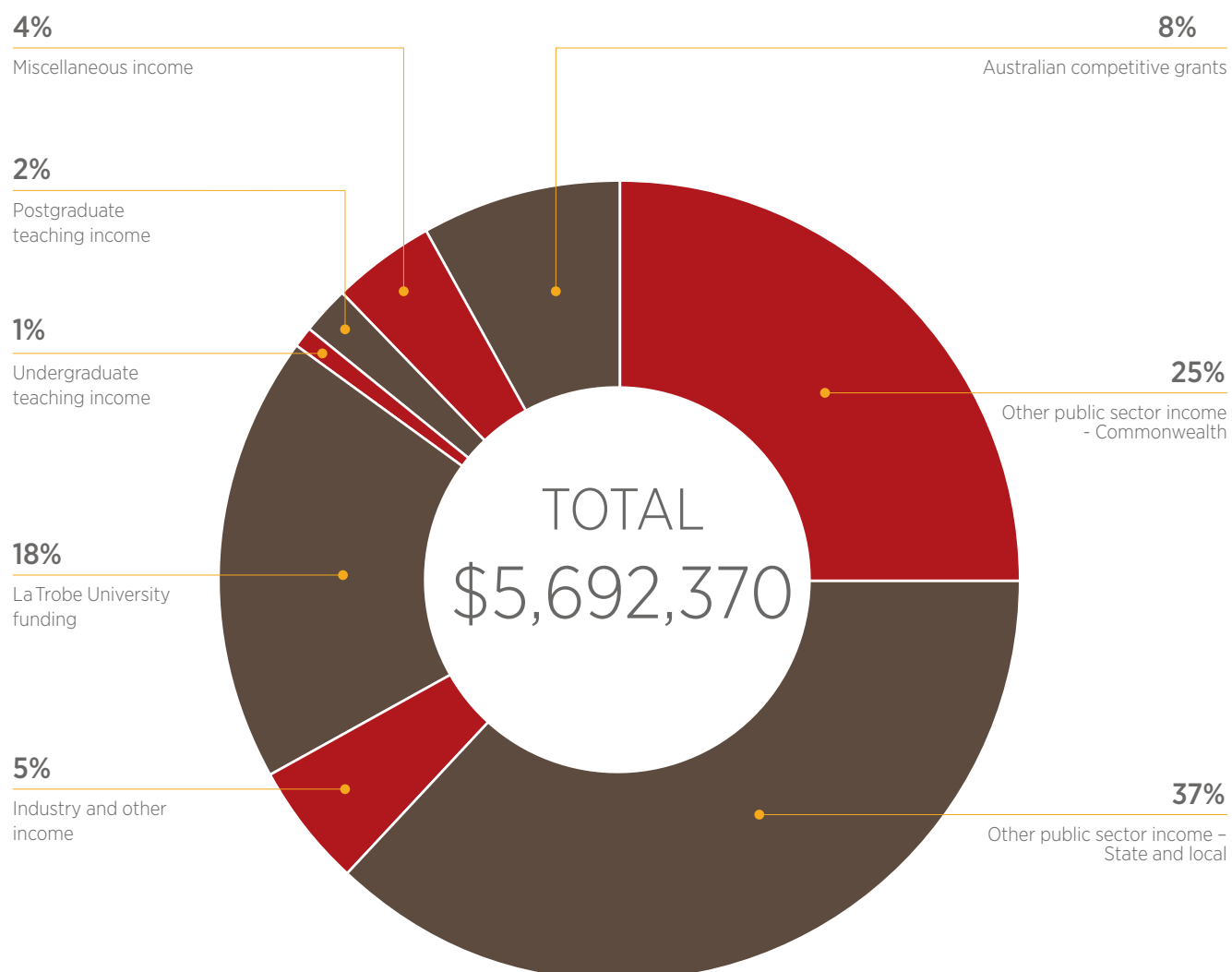
Progress will be made on the basis of scientific research and empirical information. Our Australian Research Centre contributes to this research and helps to spread the information so that sound judgements can be made and good policies implemented. The research goes beyond the issues of the LGBTIQ community and is concerned with sex and health in all sections of the community. This is why I am proud to be an Ambassador for the Centre. I congratulate its staff, partners and supporters. We will not overcome centuries of fear and ignorance alone. But we will contribute to this end and not be deflected.

STRATEGIC PLAN

ARCSHS has adopted a Strategic Plan 2016-2019 that sets the key strategic direction for the Centre to strive to become *the leading centre in Australia in sexuality research*.

ARCSHS mission is as follows:

The Australian Research Centre in Sex, Health and Society is a centre for social research into sexuality, health and the social dimensions of human relationships. It works collaboratively and in partnership with communities, community-based organisations, government and professionals in relevant fields to produce research that advances knowledge and promotes positive change in policy, practice and people's lives.

The plan outlines three main aims for the three years:

- Aim 1: Build new knowledge
- Aim 2: Build research impact
- Aim 3: Build a strong research centre

For each of these, the Centre has adopted actions towards achieving these aims and measures to track performance over time. The Strategic Plan is a key public document that outlines ARCSHS mission, strategic direction, aims and expectations of performance for the period 2016-2019. It will be reviewed annually with input from all staff to track progress against key performance indicators and to revise plans for the coming year. A new plan will be prepared by 2019.

Research themes

Since its beginnings in 1992, ARCSHS has become the major player in framing the agenda on, and delivering the evidence to understand, sex and sexuality in contemporary Australia, particularly in relation to health, education and social justice.

Through surveys of the general population, the Centre has helped track patterns and practices during the life course and over time. ARCSHS also looks specifically at aspects of health and wellbeing for people with diverse sexualities and genders, including same-sex-attracted and gender-questioning young people and older people. This includes a focus on the intersection of sexuality with other issues such as disability and mental health.

ARCSHS is one of four national centres funded to undertake strategic research as part of Australia's national response to HIV, viral hepatitis and sexually transmissible infections. This includes research that directly informs indicators within these strategies relating to the quality of life of people living with HIV, hepatitis B and C, and the sexual health of young people.

ARCSHS has unique expertise in community-engaged research, particularly working with marginalised and difficult-to-reach communities. The Centre uses a partnership approach at all stages of the research process, including prioritisation of relevant community participation in formulating research questions, designing and conducting research, and in the dissemination and application of results.

The Centre specialises in using research findings to produce training and educational resources for practitioners and to advise policy development. ARCSHS provides invaluable and widely used resources and training for teachers, health practitioners, and community and aged-care workers. The Centre works in partnership with government, service providers and

community organisations to influence and change policy to reflect the latest evidence and achieve better outcomes.

Over the three years, ARCSHS will maintain and expand the following research themes as areas of established strength:

- Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex health and wellbeing
- Blood borne viruses and sexually transmissible infections
- Gender, sexuality and social theory

In addition, the Centre will seek to develop the following as emerging research themes:

- School-based sexuality education
- Sexual and reproductive health and rights
- Policy, community and health services

Working internationally is a feature of much of ARCSHS research, but particularly in the areas of HIV and viral hepatitis. This will continue to be a focus running through the research themes outlined above. The Centre has undertaken social research and capacity-building projects, particularly in Asia and the Pacific, and provided technical advice through relationships with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, the World Health Organization, the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS, and the Coalition to Eradicate Viral Hepatitis in Asia Pacific.

RESEARCH PROJECTS

Reducing Health Disparities for Older LGBTI Australians

Australian Research Council Linkage Project

This project utilises quantitative and qualitative methods to provide detailed data on the health and support-related challenges and needs of older LGBTI Australians, as well as the educational and support needs of service providers. It will develop essential resources to support policymakers and service providers in reducing the health disparities faced by older LGBTI Australians.

Following Lives Undergoing Change (Flux Study)

National Health and Medical Research Council Project Grant

Garrett Prestage (ARCSHS and The Kirby Institute), Louisa Degenhardt (National Drug and Alcohol Research Centre), Fengyi Jin (The Kirby Institute), Jeffrey Grierson (Anglia Ruskin University, UK), Toby Lea (The Kirby Institute)

This project utilised an online questionnaire to survey over 2,000 gay and bisexual men about their drug use. Over 1,700 of these men will be followed up on a six-monthly basis to determine changes in their lives. A report on the baseline data is currently being prepared.

Men's Own: Health Behaviours of Young Australian Gay Men

Commonwealth Government Department of Health

This project explored the health behaviours of gay men aged 18-39 years. It involved a national survey of over 1,000 participants with a 12-month follow-up. The project provided a detailed examination of the lives and lifestyles of young Australian gay men, including physical, mental and sexual health.

Delivery of National LGBTI Aged Care Training in Victoria 2014-2016

Commonwealth Government Department of Social Services

Free full-day and half-day training sessions for the Victorian aged care sector, residential and community-based services, continued throughout 2016. This training, which offers specific information on the needs of older LGBTI people, involved over 200 staff from 28 different organisations across Victoria.

Healthy Equal Youth (HEY) Project: A Victorian Same-Sex Attracted and Sex and Gender Diverse (SSASGD) Youth Suicide Prevention Initiative

The HEY Project consists of a consortium of nine place-based and six state-wide partners and aims to improve the mental wellbeing of SSASGD young Victorians. In 2016, management of HEY passed to YACVic, but GLHV@ARCSHS continues to provide strategic advice to the Victorian Government, YACVic and HEY Partners.

Rainbow Network

Rainbow Network is a state-wide Victorian support and capacity-building network for anyone working with same-sex attracted, intersex, transgender and gender diverse (SSAITGD) young people. Val's Café, a program of GLHV@ARCSHS, works to improve healthy ageing pathways, care, and visibility of older LGBTI people. To do so, Val's Café works directly with service providers to foster an understanding of the histories and experiences of older LGBTI people and how these may impact on access to support services. Val's Café aims to create safe and inclusive aged care and health services that recognise and value older LGBTI people.

Decision-making Principles for the Care of Infants, Children and Adolescents with Intersex Variations

Victorian Government Department of Health and Human Services

Tiffany Jones, William Leonard

This study explores Australian service provision for infants, children and adolescents with intersex variations using existing research, key informant interviews and discourse analysis. It considers the existence and usefulness of service provision and ideas and assumptions about people with intersex variations influencing existing services and delivery towards developing appropriate decision-making principles.

OUT in the CALD: Promoting Culturally Diverse, LGBTI-inclusive Services

Victorian Department of Premier and Cabinet

GLHV@ARCSHS in partnership with VTMH will be developing information and training resources for agencies that provide health-related services to LGBTI people affiliated with faith-based and multicultural communities. The project is funded through the Victorian Government's Community Harmony Grants Program.

Policing for Same-sex Attracted and Sex and Gender Diverse (SSASGD) Young Victorians

This project aims to improve Victoria Police's (VicPol) engagement with SSASGD young people. It involves state-wide surveys of police and SSASGD young people attitudes, as well as focus groups and interviews in three regional locations, to gain a better understanding of the interactions between VicPol and SSASGD young people.

Rainbow Tick Accreditation Program

Licensing agreement with Quality Innovation Performance

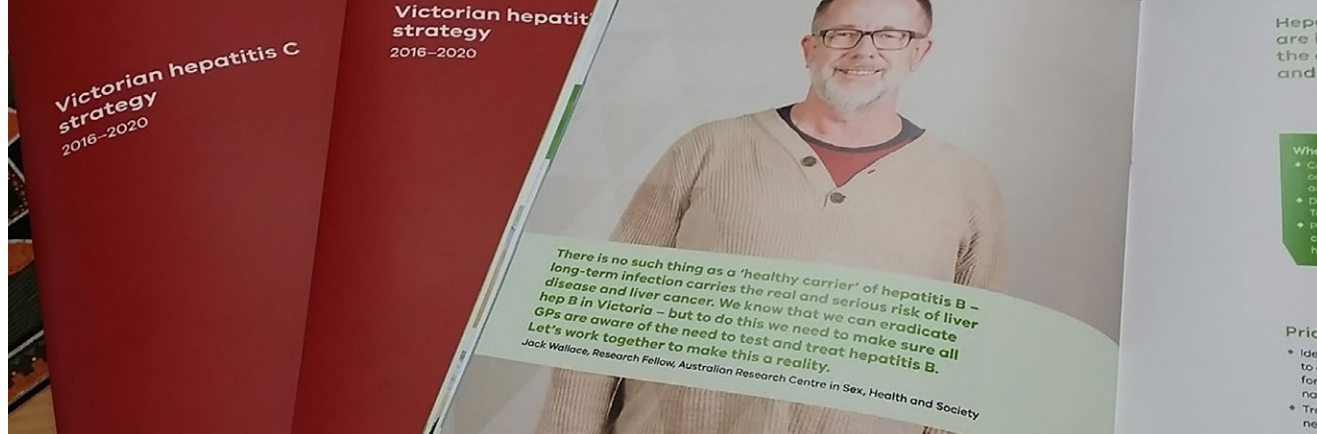

The Rainbow Tick consists of six standards against which organisations can be accredited to demonstrate that all their practices, procedures and protocols are LGBTI-inclusive. The Rainbow Tick Standards were developed by GLHV@ARCSHS in collaboration with Quality Innovation Performance (QIP), a not-for-profit accreditation organisation dedicated to delivering accreditation and support services to a diverse range of organisations. Organisations that gain Rainbow Tick accreditation are listed on a national registry.

Best Practice Approaches to Preventing Violence against Women

Women's Health Victoria

An intersectional framework for Victorian Councils' regional prevention plans and the work of women's health services state-wide was developed with funding from the Victorian Government, in conjunction with Women with Disabilities Victoria and the Multicultural Centre for Women's Health. GLHV@ARCSHS is also represented on the Ministerial Taskforce on the Prevention of Family Violence and has been invited to address a number of national and international conferences on family violence and LGBTI communities.

Something for Them: Addressing the Needs of Same-sex Attracted and Sex and Gender Diverse (SSASGD) Young People who are Newly Arrived, Refugees or Asylum Seekers

Assia Altman sub-fund, Australian Communities Foundation

William Leonard, David Mejia-Canales (Parliament of Victoria)

This project builds on the recommendations of an earlier pilot project, Nothing for Them (2014), which aimed to understand the support needs of SSASGD young people who are newly arrived, refugees or seeking asylum. Stage two of the project, Something for Them, relies on reviews of the legal and social standing of newly arrived SSASGD young people in their countries of origin and Australia's obligations towards refugees and asylum seekers under international law. The project's key findings and recommendations were published in a community report, Something for Them: Addressing the Support Needs of Same-Sex Attracted and Sex and Gender Diverse (SSASGD) Young People who are Newly Arrived, Refugees or Asylum Seekers, which makes recommendations to government and relevant agencies aimed at improving the quality of available services.

Men's Own: Health and Wellbeing of Young Gay Men Living in Mainland China

This project involves a national online survey of gay men aged 18-39 years living in Mainland China. It provides first-ever data on numerous aspects of the lives of young Chinese gay men, including sex, relationships, friendships, stigma, social support and health. It provides data for cross-cultural comparisons with a similar survey that investigators in the team conducted in Australia.

GLBTIQ People's Participation in Cervical Cancer Screening

PapScreen Victoria

This project surveyed 303 GLBTIQ people with a cervix about their participation in Pap testing in Victoria via an online questionnaire. PapScreen Victoria will incorporate the findings of this research into existing health professional education, as it is important that health professionals providing cervical screening be educated on the broad range of issues and barriers facing the GLBTIQ community.

Preventing Harm, Promoting Justice: Legal Responses to 'Gay Conversion' Therapy

This project will explore the history, prevalence and nature of the ex-gay movement in Australia. Ex-gay therapy is a counselling practice aimed at making lesbian and gay people 'straight', or, at the very least, assisting them repress their same-sex attractions. In partnership with the Human Rights Law Centre, this project will provide evidence to determine the need for legislative or other measures to inform regulatory and legal reform appropriate to Australia.

Combating the Rapid Rise of Sexually Transmitted Infections among Older Australians: Improving Safe-Sex Practice and Health, Social and Economic Outcomes

Strengthening Community Responses to Hepatitis B

Chronic hepatitis B is a national public health priority disproportionately affecting Australians born in countries of high prevalence such as China, Vietnam and the Sudan. This project identifies how people with hepatitis B from these communities understand and respond to the infection.

Improving Access to Optimal Clinical Care for People with Chronic Hepatitis B through the Implementation of a Nurse-Led Model of Care

National Health and Medical Research Council Translation of Research into Practice (TRIP) Fellowship

This project is operating in a community health service where unexpectedly there are few patients with hepatitis B and the rate of testing is also low. The focus of the project has therefore shifted to improving the workforce's capacity to test people at risk for hepatitis B.

The Liver Health Project

The number of people with hepatitis C developing advanced liver disease, and dying as a result of liver disease, continues to increase. The Liver Health Project deepens understandings of the experiences of people with hepatitis C with interviews designed to identify the rapidly changing treatment environment, and shifts in experiences at clinics and with health-care providers.

Hepatitis C Cure

Commonwealth Government Department of Health

This project explores how service providers and policy makers understand the concept of cure in relation to hepatitis C, and investigates the implications of DAA treatment on future models of care and approaches to hepatitis C awareness and prevention. The project includes a systematic review of the Australian and international media and community education materials related to hepatitis C treatment and cure.

Eradicating Hepatitis C in Australia: A Review

Direct acting antiviral (DAA) treatment for hepatitis C became available for all people with hepatitis C from March 2016. DAA treatment is funded through the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme, and aims to eradicate hepatitis C in Australia. Questions remain on whether treatment uptake will match expectations and achieve eradication, and whether existing hepatitis C management systems will be effective in delivery and implementation. This project will investigate these questions through interviews with leaders in the hepatitis C clinical, community and policy sectors.

Curing Hepatitis C among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People: Investigating the Impact of Hepatitis C Cure at the Health Service, Community and Individual Level

The availability of DAAs will have a substantial impact on all people with hepatitis C, including Indigenous Australians living with the infection. This project will document the perspectives of Indigenous health service providers on the barriers and enablers to the hepatitis C cure.

Hepatitis B: Trajectories of Care

People with hepatitis B, general practitioners and practice nurses participated in semi-structured interviews about the process of testing, diagnosis and contact tracing for hepatitis B. This information will be used to improve the diagnostic event for people with hepatitis B and support contact tracing.



HIV Futures

HIV Futures is a series of national surveys of people living with HIV (PLHIV) in Australia that has been repeated periodically since 1997. Data were collected for HIV Futures 8 during 2015/16. The survey focuses on psychological and physical wellbeing of PLHIV, treatment use, relationships, stigma and discrimination. HIV Futures 9 will be conducted in 2018.

What Works and Why (W3) Project: Understanding What Works and Why in Peer-based Health Promotion Approaches in HIV and Hepatitis C

The W3 Project is a collaboration with peer-based programs in community organisations to trial the application of systems thinking and quality improvement approaches to understand and demonstrate the role and impact of peer-based programs. Our partners include peer and community-based organisations working with people who use drugs, sex workers, people living with HIV, and gay men in the response to HIV and hepatitis C. The project has been refunded until 2019.

LifeTimes: A National Cohort Study of HIV and Ageing

This is a longitudinal cohort study that began in 2010, and has followed an initial cohort of over 1,000 older gay men over five years of annual surveys. It explores issues of ageing and health among older gay men, with a focus on those living with HIV.

Healthy Minds: The HIV and Mental Health Study

This project involves an in-depth investigation into the mental health of people living with HIV. It provides, for the first time, detailed information on multiple dimensions of mental health and seeks a better understanding of why rates of mental health problems in this population are substantially higher than national averages.

HIV and Mobility

To respond to HIV in mobile populations in Australia, the multi-sectoral Community of Practice for Action on HIV and Mobility (CoPAHM) was established. This included the production of a national report card to assess progress on actions recommended in the earlier report HIV and Mobility in Australia: Road Map for Action, and collaborative policy presentations at State and National levels.

HIV and Priority CALD Communities

There are increasing numbers of PLHIV in Australia who are migrants and/or from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) communities, yet little is known about the health needs or experiences of PLHIV from these communities. This scoping study will explore options for a periodic study of PLHIV from priority CALD and migrant communities.

Blood Borne Virus (BBV) Program: Supporting the HIV and Hepatitis Workforce

The Blood Borne Virus (BBV) Program works to strengthen the Victorian BBV workforce, and to engage the broader health and community workforce to increase its capacity to respond to BBVs (HIV and viral hepatitis) in the wider community.

PozQoL - Valuing quality of life among PLHIV

Living Positive Victoria, Positive Living NSW, Queensland Positive People

This project, in collaboration with National Association of People with HIV Australia and ViiV HealthCare, is developing a short, validated scale to measure quality of life among PLHIV. This first stage was a scoping and development study, with the scale validation planned for 2017. This scale will be used by community, peer and clinical programs to evaluate their influence on the wellbeing and quality of life of PLHIV.

National Viral Hepatitis Needs Assessment: China

Coalition to Eradicate Viral Hepatitis in Asia Pacific

China has the largest absolute number of people in the world infected with viral hepatitis. This project documented the personal and social impact of living with viral hepatitis. People with chronic viral hepatitis and key service providers in five Chinese cities were interviewed, with findings reviewed to identify key issues, concepts and themes.

Cure Study: Exploring Understandings, Expectations and Experiences of Hepatitis C Treatment and Cure

New treatments are available to cure hepatitis C in 12 weeks with few side-effects. In order to understand the experience of taking these treatments, 20 patients on the new treatment regimens will be interviewed about their experience of treatment and their expectations of achieving a cure.

An HIV Cure: Ethical and Social Consequences of Cure-focused Research

Sexual Wellbeing and Ageing: A Study of Older Australian Women

This research addresses important issues of ageism and sexism that together affect older women's health and wellbeing. The findings will inform the link between ageing, sexuality and more general dimensions of health and wellbeing, and advance our understanding of issues central to policy and services for older Australians.

Muscling Up: Australian Men, Sexualisation and Body Image Enhancement

Australian Research Council Discovery Project

This study focuses on men's views about male body image and the social pressures for body development based upon appearance, by using interviews and focus groups. The study will also examine how male bodies are represented in popular culture and the ways in which men's sexuality and appearances are changing.

The Effectiveness of Global Sexual Rights Policy in Education

This study explores the usefulness and harmfulness of global rights-based policy processes for GLBTIQ students from varying contexts. It maps transnational discourses on GLBTIQ students in global education policies and processes and their reflection of regional perspectives, compared with localised approaches.

Contraceptive Use, Pregnancy Intention and Decisions of Australian Women (CUPID): A Longitudinal Study of Patterns of Contraception Use and Access to Contraceptive Information, Advice and Services for Young Australian Women

This longitudinal project examined patterns of contraceptive use among a national sample of Australian women aged 18-23 years. It explored factors associated with unintended pregnancy, and the types of contraceptive methods used by women reporting an unintended pregnancy. It also examined access to contraceptive information, advice and services.

Australian Contraceptive CHOice pProject (ACCORD): Increasing the Use of Long-acting Reversible Contraception

National Health and Medical Research Council

ACCORD will offer GPs across Victoria specialised training in long-acting reversible contraceptives (LARCs). It will recruit 60 GPs to undertake training in 'LARC First' contraceptive counselling and rapid referral for insertion. The study will examine whether improved knowledge and rapid referral increases LARC uptake and reduces unintended pregnancies.

Sixth National Survey of Secondary Students and Sexual Health

A national survey of the sexual attitudes, knowledge and experiences of Australian secondary students has been carried out approximately every five years since 1992, each of them funded by the Commonwealth Government Department of Health. It has been a significant source of key information for policy and programming about STIs and other BBVs for young people, and contributes to the indicators of the National STI strategy. The sixth iteration of this survey will be conducted in 2018.

Talking Sexual (and Reproductive) Health – Part 2

Commonwealth Government Department of Health

Using the results of the Secondary Students and Sexual Health Survey (see above) completed in 2013, this project developed teaching resources to support the sexual health component of the Australian Curriculum in Health and Physical Education. Stage Two focused on lesson plans and resources for teaching year 7 and 8 students.

Sexual Health and Young Adults (The Friends, Sex and Benefits Project)

This study focused on the social and cultural contexts of young adults' friendships and relationships, and how these influence their practices of STI testing. The findings were published in a broadsheet report to guide health promotion and health service responses and will be available in forthcoming journal articles.

What Does It Take? Developing Informed and Effective Tertiary Responses to Violence and Abuse for Women and Girls with Disabilities in Australia

This project is a language documentation of an endangered language in North East India. The language is a variety of Meitei, thought to be a Tibeto-Burman language, and is spoken by the Nupa Amaibi, an indigenous transgender community. This is an interdisciplinary project, combining linguistics, queer theory and public health.

Shouting Back: Exploring Street Harassment Victims' Justice Needs and Justice Responses

La Trobe Transforming Human Societies Research Focus Area

This project explores street harassment victims' justice needs and their preferred justice responses. Given the dearth of research on street harassment in Australia, this research also seeks to explore participants' experiences of street harassment, and the ways in which these experiences are shaped or informed by gender, sexual orientation and ethnicity.



GLHV@ARCSHS

GLHV@ARCSHS is a lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex (LGBTI) health and wellbeing, policy and resource unit. We are funded by the Victorian Government and our mission is to improve the health and wellbeing of LGBTI Victorians and the quality of care they receive.

The past year has been a difficult one, with attacks on our programs and staff fuelled by an ugly and polarised public debate on equal love and same sex marriage. However, we have received enormous support from LGBTI, mainstream, government and academic representatives, who share our commitment to justice, equity and LGBTI social inclusion. Early in 2016, we dropped 'Gay and Lesbian Health Victoria' and became simply GLHV@ARCSHS. In 2016 we: renewed a number of our key resources; met increasing demand for our training and resources across the health, education and community sectors; created new research partnerships; and consolidated our LGBTI work in the family violence, multi-faith, and multicultural sectors.

Research and Publications

GLHV@ARCSHS has developed a number of new research partnerships through the following projects:

- *Preventing Harm, Promoting Justice: Legal Responses to 'Gay Conversion' Therapy* funded by La Trobe University and delivered in collaboration with the Human Rights Law Centre
- *Identifying the Experiences and Needs of LGBTI Communities Before, During and After Emergencies in Victoria*, funded by the Victorian Government and led by Women's Health in the North, Women's Health Goulburn North East, and Monash Injury Research Institute
- *Policing for Same-Sex Attracted and Sex and Gender Diverse (SSASGD) Young Victorians*, funded by Victoria Police and delivered in partnership with ARCSHS

- *OUT in the CALD: Promoting Culturally Diverse, LGBTI-inclusive Services*, funded by the Victorian Government and delivered in partnership with Victorian Transcultural Mental Health (VTMH)
- *A Consultation-Based Review of DHHS's Decision-Making Principles for the Care of Infants, Children and Adolescents with Intersex Variations*, funded by the Victorian Government and run in partnership with ARCSHS and the Human Rights Law Centre.

On 7 September, GLHV@ARCSHS released *Something for Them: Addressing the Support Needs of Same-Sex Attracted and Sex and Gender Diverse (SSASGD) Young People who are Newly Arrived, Refugees or Asylum Seekers*. The report, launched by Imam Nur Warsame, documents the lived experience of recently-arrived SSASGD young people in Australia and makes recommendations to government and relevant agencies aimed at improving the quality of services they receive.

Resources and Training Clearinghouse

The clearinghouse is a major resource for service providers, researchers and consumers interested in LGBTI wellbeing and inclusive practice. In 2016, the portal averaged 1,601 unique hits per month.

The HOW2 Program – Organisational reform

The HOW2 Program focuses on organisational systems and culture change. It is built on six standards of LGBTI-inclusive practice (The Rainbow Tick) and consists of four separate five-hour sessions delivered over six months. In 2016, GLHV@ARCSHS signed licensing agreements with Shine in

South Australia, QuAC in Queensland and Working It Out in Tasmania to deliver the HOW2 in their respective states. GLHV@ARCSHS has developed a comprehensive HOW2 Trainer's Manual, which will be provided to state partners, including ACON in New South Wales. GLHV@ARCSHS delivered two HOW2 Programs this year to 45 participants from over 20 different organisations. The second program included participants from the legal sector for the first time.

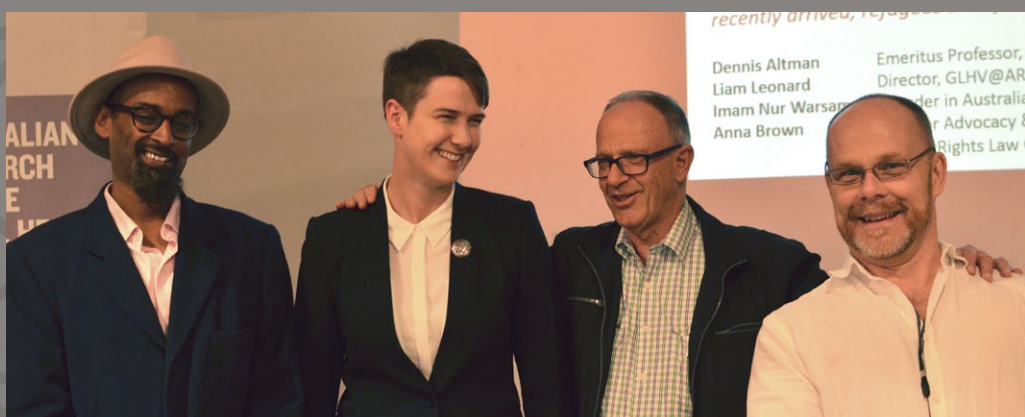
Generic LGBTI training – Professional development

GLHV@ARCSHS delivered three-hour LGBTI professional development sessions to over 610 staff from a diverse range of agencies including aged care, assisted reproductive and family services, community health, mental health and more. GLHV@ARCSHS provided three in-house LGBTI training sessions to 55 La Trobe University staff and students at the Bundoora campus.

Val's Café

LGBTI aged care training

Early in 2016, the Commonwealth government announced an additional 12 months' funding for the delivery of the national LGBTI aged care training managed by the National LGBTI Health Alliance. Val's Café, in collaboration with TGV, coordinated the roll out of the additional training in Victoria, with all of GLHV@ARCSHS sessions now booked. Val's Café also provided tailored sessions for the Commonwealth Home Support and the Home and Community Care programs, and continued to work closely with the regional Diversity Advisors to develop and support LGBTI-inclusive practice in Victoria.



Website and presentations

Val's Café's website and newsletter continue to provide information, resources and news on LGBTI ageing and aged care. Val's Café presented at a number of LGBTI and aged-care forums and conferences including: Commonwealth Home Support Programme / Home and Community Care Program forums; International Federation on Ageing conference in Brisbane; and co-presented with Alzheimer's Australia NSW 'Still Gay...the Experience of LGBT Australians Living with Dementia' at HammondCare's International Dementia Conference in NSW and Alzheimer's New Zealand conference in Wellington.

Young People

Healthy Equal Youth (HEY) Project: A Victorian Same-Sex Attracted and Sex and Gender Diverse (SSASGD) Youth Suicide Prevention Initiative

In 2016, the management of the HEY Project passed to YACVic, but GLHV@ARCSHS continues to provide strategic advice to government, YACVic and HEY Partners. The HEY Project consists of a consortium of place-based and state-wide partners aimed at improving the mental health and wellbeing of SSASGD young Victorians. In 2016, the Victorian Government provided additional funding for Parents of Gender Diverse Children, and new place-based partners in Warrnambool, Ballarat, Gippsland Lakes and Morwell. The HEY Project now includes 9 place-based partners and 6 state-wide agencies.

Rainbow Network (RN)

RN provides information, training and support for people who work with SSAITGD young people in Victoria. RN, in partnership with Zoe Belle Gender Collective, Safe Schools Coalition Victoria and Victorian AIDS Council, has been running a rural and regional roadshow delivering LGBTI-inclusive training to workers in Bendigo, Swan Hill, Warrnambool and Hamilton, with further sessions planned for Ballarat, Lakes Entrance and Mildura. In 2016, RN held sessions on how to facilitate effective SSAITGD support groups and a whole day Working with Families Forum looking at how LGBTI and family services can better meet the needs of SSAITGD young people. RN is currently building relationships with sporting associations, including Pride Cup, Netball Victoria and the AFL, to promote greater LGBTI inclusion. In 2016, RN membership grew to 800.

Safe Schools Coalition Victoria (SSCV)

In mid-2016, under Victorian Government direction, SSCV withdrew from Safe Schools Coalition Australia (SSCA). SSCV is now funded solely by the State Government and will continue to provide advice to SSCA and work with state and territory partners. In 2016, SSCV hosted the first episode in its seminar series on issues relating to SSAIGD young people and education, given by Anne Mitchell and Lynne Hillier, 'Scientific truth: The research that resulted in Safe Schools Coalition'. On 10 October, SSCV in partnership with Minus18 and the Australian Lesbian and Gay Archives, celebrated LGBTI+ history month by launching a toolkit of posters, case studies, interviews and resources. SSCV provided professional development to 6,142 school staff, distributed over 15,000 resources to school communities, and at the end of 2016, 282 schools were SSCV members.

Rainbow Tick Program

GLHV@ARCSHS, in partnership with the national accreditation body QIP, developed the Rainbow Tick Program (RTP). The Program promotes LGBTI-inclusive service provision by providing training and assisting organisations prepare for Rainbow Tick accreditation. This year GLHV@ARCSHS revised and updated two of its key RTP resources, the LGBTI-inclusive practice audit tool and the Rainbow Tick guide to LGBTI-inclusive practice. On 17 October 2016, Dr Steve Clark, CEO of QIP, presented on the RTP and its possible application in other countries at the 33rd International Society for Quality in Health Care in Tokyo.

Conferences and Advisory Bodies

GLHV@ARCSHS presented at a wide range of academic, LGBTI and industry forums this year including: Body Futures Forum - Creating a New Human Body Exhibition, the Melbourne Museum; The Many Faces of Global Health, Global Ideas Forum, University of Melbourne; The Emergency Management Conference, Albert Park Melbourne; AGPAL and QIP 2016 Conference, Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre; and IDAHOBIT Day, Hobart Function and Conference Centre, Tasmania.

In 2016, GLHV@ARCSHS was represented on: Victoria Police's External Education Advisory Group and LGBTI Portfolio Reference Group; the Victorian Government's LGBTI Taskforce and 'What's Important to YOUTH' Sector Reference Group; Ministerial-led roundtable discussions on Family

Violence; the Victorian/Commonwealth Community Care Advisory Committee (VCCAC); GALFA LGBT Homelessness Advisory Group and many more.

Other Activities

LGBTI Family Violence

On 25 October, GLHV@ARCSHS, along with VAC and TGV, auspiced The Dark Side of the Rainbow, an all-day event run by MAROPA Productions exploring LGBTI family violence. The City of Yarra provided funding, and the event was opened by Rowena Allen and Brenda Appleton. It included presentations and a facilitated panel discussion about what is needed to make the family violence sector LGBTI-inclusive and a cabaret performance showing the physical and psychological costs of LGBTI family violence.

GLHV@ARCSHS has received funds to assist with implementing the Regional Action Plans for the Prevention of Violence Against Women and Children and was invited to present on LGBTI people's experience of family violence at the ANROWS, AWAVA, LBQ Women's Health, and Stop Domestic Violence conferences.

GLHV@ARCSHS was part of a consortium, led by the Yarra Glen Football Netball Club, that won the Inclusive and Connected Communities Award at the Parks and Leisure Australia's 2016 National Awards of Excellence, for the 2015 Pride Cup.

National Conferences and Forums

An historic apology

On 24 May 2016, the Premier, Daniel Andrews, offered a moving apology on behalf of the Victorian Parliament to gay men convicted of what, today, are lawful sexual activities. GLHV@ARCSHS was proud to be invited to attend the Premier's speech in Parliament as a member of the consortium that had made the case to the Victorian Government for expungement of gay men's prior, historical convictions.

TEACHING PROGRAM

Higher Degree Research (HDR) Program

Under the leadership of ARCSHS HDR coordinator, Sue Dyson, the ARCSHS HDR postgraduate program continued to go from strength to strength in 2016. Students presented their research at conferences, won awards, published papers and continued to work on their research. These honours are detailed elsewhere in this report. Jennifer Power coordinated the student seminar series, which provides an important component of the HDR program.

At the start of the year we had 20 students. During the year, Marisa Monagle, Karyn Fulcher, Amie O'Shea, Rachel Thorpe and Joe Latham were awarded their PhDs. We welcomed three new students, Paulina Ezer, Michael McDermott and Brooke Hollingshead in early 2016. At the end of the year, we had sixteen students who are at various stages of data collection and writing their theses.

Postgraduate supervisors contribute their time and expertise to work with students on their studies. Supervisors work in teams, with at least one principal supervisor and one co-supervisor for each student, as well as a panel of two or three other staff members who meet twice a year to monitor students' progress. Undergraduate Teaching Program: Contemporary Issues in Sex and Sexuality - HTL1CSS

In semester 2, 2016, ARCSHS delivered its path-breaking, online, undergraduate, elective unit called 'Contemporary Issues in Sex and Sexuality' for the sixth time. The unit is notable for its subject matter, its mode of teaching—which includes the use of both synchronous and asynchronous sessions designed specifically to promote active learning—and its cross-college and cross-campus availability. 'Contemporary Issues in Sex and Sexuality' cuts across disciplinary boundaries to offer a valuable and interesting learning experience for students from all backgrounds. The unit uses advanced web teaching and learning technologies. It draws on a wide range of sources including media, web-based material and theory from the social sciences to help students examine and re-assess the range of meanings, values, assumptions and expectations embedded in social understandings of sex and sexuality. In 2016, the unit was completed by a total of 35 students from various La Trobe campuses.
