Celebrating Professor Angela Taft's Retirement with a Festschrift

Professor Angela Taft, former director of the Judith Lumley Centre (JLC) and pioneer in preventing and responding to Violence against Women (VAW) and Reproduction and Sexual Health in primary healthcare settings, has retired from La Trobe University. Thankfully, Angela is continuing as an Emeritus Professor at La Trobe. Angela began her career at La Trobe in 2001 as a



Research Fellow. A strong advocate for women's health and human rights, she coestablished the La Trobe Violence Against Women (LAVAWN) network to bring together scholars from across the university. She was Director of JLC from 2014-2017.

Angela's work has been recognised nationally and internationally, with her early intervention trial to improve the safety and wellbeing of mothers experiencing intimate partner violence replicated in the USA and Peru. The World Health Organization has sought her expertise on interventions in primary healthcare settings and she has been funded by the United Nations Family Planning Association to develop a curriculum for health care professionals in Timor-Leste and Papua New Guinea to reduce VAW. Angela's most recent RCT, HARMONY, was highly commended by the Victorian Multicultural Commission in 2021. She has been awarded the Champion for Women (Women's Health Victoria 25th anniversary), Public Health Fellow (Public Health Association of Australia), and NNVAWI Excellence in Policy and Practice (Nursing Network on Violence Against Women International).

Members of the JLC, family, friends and colleagues celebrated her life's work on the 5th of October 2022 with a formal farewell in the format of a modified Festschrift. A Festschrift usually includes a volume of writings by different authors presented as a tribute to a scholar. Our JLC Festschrift comprised an afternoon of congratulatory video and in-person messages to Angela from fellow national and international academics and former PhD students wishing her all the best in her future endeavours. Best wishes and endearing messages were received from as far away as the UK, Ghana, Brazil, and Singapore (snippets below). The celebration concluded with an abundant afternoon tea and bonhomie.

A personal note

I started my PhD study with Angela in January 2013 after working as a project manager on an RCT with her the year prior. I was an experienced clinician and educator but a very novice researcher, stepping into the intimidating world of the Mother and Child Health Research Centre (now JLC) and higher degree study. Three years later, I had published many academic papers and was awarded a research medal for my PhD on family violence and Maternal and Child Health (MCH) nursing practice. While this outcome was due to personal hard work, much of the credit must also be attributed to the quality of supervision I received. Angela displayed real passion for 'violence against women' research which was infectious, and she projected genuine interest and confidence in my succeeding as a future research leader.

Angela has an incredible intellect and was a formidable supervisor, with very high expectations that were strived for, but not always met. While praise from her was hard earned and often sparse, I was always made to feel capable of anything I wanted to achieve. Her constructive feedback and enthusiasm made me want to do better. She makes HDR students feel they are her highest priority, which I know isn't always true, especially at the time of my PhD, when she became extra busy as Director of JLC.

Throughout my candidature (and beyond), I was encouraged at great length to 'lean in' and accept opportunities she manufactured, consequently building networks with many influential national and international colleagues e.g., through the Safer Families CRE and the Nursing Network on Violence Against Women International. I was initially a student representative on this international network but am now the immediate past President. This group of world leading academics in the field of family violence research provides me with ongoing mentorship and facilitates international opportunities in grant writing, research projects and joint publications.

I am forever grateful to Angela for all that she has seen in me and supported me with. Her modelling of exemplary HDR supervision is something I continue to benefit from and enjoy, as I now take on the JLC research stream lead on preventing and responding to VAW and have many of my own PhD students at the Centre. Thank you, Angela.

Sexual and Reproductive Health Research at the Judith Lumley Centre

The Sexual and Reproductive Health research stream in the Judith Lumley Centre (JLC) has two key focus areas: unintended pregnancy and abortion, and reproductive coercion. The senior researchers in the stream, myself (lead) and Associate Professor Leesa Hooker, are research fellows in the NHMRC Centre of Research Excellence in Sexual and Reproductive Health for Women in Primary Care (SPHERE CRE), and Professor Angela Taft is a SPHERE CRE Chief Investigator. This gives us and our students unique access to collaboration with leading national and international expertise in sexual and reproductive health research.

Key research currently being undertaken within this stream includes population-level estimates and trends of sexual and reproductive health risk factors and outcomes, disparities in these trends across population sub-groups, and measurement development and validation. Our team has a strong focus on rural health, facilitated by Leesa's joint appointment between JLC and the La Trobe Rural Health School (based at La Trobe's Bendigo campus), which is Australia's largest rural health school.

We utilise large population-based datasets, routinely collected and administrative data, nationally representative surveys, and data linkage, as well as qualitative data to generate new understandings of observed trends, patterns, and relationships. These methods also allow marginal groups to be represented in our research. Datasets include the Victorian Perinatal Data Collection (VPDC), the National Perinatal Data Collection (NPDC), the Australian Longitudinal Study of Women's Health (ALSWH), and data linkage with the Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS), Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) and hospital admissions datasets.

The stream has expanded by three new students in the last year:

Desireé LaGrappe is a previous Johns Hopkins University Gender Equity & Justice scholar with international nursing and research experience in high-income and low-income countries. During her PhD, she will develop and validate a clinically relevant prevalence measure for reproductive coercion. In 2021, Desireé was awarded a prestigious NHMRC PhD scholarship, and her work is greatly facilitated by her broad international and national research and clinical networks.

Brianna Pike commenced her Professional Doctorate in 2022 and will explore the impact of reproductive coercion on victim-survivors' safety, life choices, and help-seeking behaviours. Brianna is an experienced social worker, sexual assault counsellor, consultant, and educator. During her studies, she will engage with sexual assault services and victim-survivors of reproductive coercion to advance the understanding of how reproductive coercion impacts victim-survivors more broadly, beyond initial health impacts, and how services assess and respond to victim-survivors' needs.

Genevieve Edwards commenced her PhD studies in Semester 2, 2022 and will examine how rurality influences pregnancy options for women with unintended pregnancy. Genevieve is a registered nurse who has dedicated over half of her 20year nursing career to delivering sexual and reproductive health services, in a variety of educational and primary health care settings in regional, rural and remote parts of Australia. She is currently a lecturer at the Australian Catholic University. Her PhD will extend work on unintended pregnancy and abortion undertaken by myself, Leesa, and Angela; papers which are currently under review.

Our team presented our research at the Children by Choice Reproductive Rights and Abortion 2022 Conference held in Brisbane in August, where we also had the opportunity to meet with national collaborators for the first time since the pandemic. The team is hosting a recently established university-wide research interest group with a focus on sexual and reproductive health topics including unintended pregnancy, abortion, and reproductive coercion. The group was initiated to connect researchers across La Trobe with aligned research interests, and will provide opportunities for collaboration on joint publications, grant applications, supervision of HDR students, and general information sharing. Breastfeeding for First Nations women and infants

In 2017, a First Nations caseload midwifery model was introduced at the hospital where I worked. I was one of the first to have my son, my first child, in this new model of care. It was incredible to receive culturally safe care throughout my pregnancy and I was grateful to have this option.

As an Aboriginal midwife, I was then offered an opportunity to be involved in the evaluation of this model; the Baggarrook Yurrongi project. I was first involved as a research assistant, and then, with encouragement, as a HDR student. My supervisors (Prof Della Forster and Prof Helen McLachlan) and I identified a need to focus on breastfeeding outcomes for First Nations women and infants and this became the topic for my Master's degree thesis. I was privileged to undertake telephone surveys with participants, where women shared their experiences of

having a baby supported by the First Nations-specific caseload model. I collected data for the overall project, and also asked women specific questions for my Master's research on breastfeeding.

My thesis, entitled 'Exploring breastfeeding initiation and maintenance for First Nations women and infants in Victoria, Australia' consisted of two components. The first component was a systematic review of breastfeeding rates and the factors associated with breastfeeding for First Nations women in Australia; the first systematic review of its kind. The second component explored breastfeeding outcomes for women who participated in the Baggarrook Yurrongi project. These breastfeeding outcomes included breastfeeding initiation, breastfeeding at three months, factors associated with breastfeeding at three months, and reasons for stopping breastfeeding.

In the systematic review, we found that nationally, rates of breastfeeding were lower for First Nations women compared to the general population. There was evidence that First Nations-specific maternity services, among other factors, improved rates of breastfeeding for First Nations women and infants. In the Baggarrook Yurrongi project, we found that First Nations women, most of whom received care in the culturally specific model, had high rates of breastfeeding initiation and breastfeeding at three months in comparison to national rates of breastfeeding for First Nations women. Together, these findings demonstrate that culturally-specific midwifery models of care can enhance rates of breastfeeding among First Nations women.

I took a slightly longer path to completing my thesis – submitting five months later than expected – but received the good news in October that I had passed. I was excited to attend my graduation in December. This was my first graduation ceremony as I was not able to attend my undergraduate graduation, so it felt extra special this time. I want to thank La Trobe University, JLC, and my supervisors Helen and Della for the unwavering support and guidance to complete my degree.

My PhD Journey

I submitted my PhD 'Implementing and evaluating place-based initiatives for children' in May this year, and found out in September that I passed. What a relief! The setting for my PhD project was Communities for Children (CfC) - one of Australia's largest place-based initiatives. My research explored how evidencebased programs can be effectively implemented in place-based initiatives for disadvantaged children. I found that implementation was facilitated by organisational readiness, skilled and enthusiastic staff, adequate resourcing, and attention to 'place'. I worked closely with the Australian Department of Social Services to design my three studies so that the findings would be useful to them and help influence how services are delivered to improve outcomes for Australian children. I published four papers along the way – a scoping review, a qualitative paper from interviews with government personnel who oversee CfC, and two papers from an online survey with community personnel who select and implement CfC programs and services. I am very thankful to my wonderful supervisors for their guidance and support along the way – Jan, Lisa, Sharinne, Stacey and Naomi Hackworth (yes, a lot, it's a long story...).

During my PhD, I provided research support to JLC's Prevention of Violence Against Women and Children team. This experience, along with the solid grounding in research skills I gained during my time at JLC, led to me being offered a Post-doctoral Research Fellow position at the Safer Families Research Centre at The University of Melbourne. My first project is looking at women's experience of psychological violence — a poorly understood and under-researched topic. I am currently working three days a week in this role, and two days a week at La Trobe on a couple of projects. JLC was a wonderful Centre to undertake my PhD. The regular program of educational activities meant that I learned so much along the way. And PhD students receive an abundance of formal and informal support. I met so many smart, articulate, generous, and kind people, and made lifelong friends. The final step of my PhD journey was graduation in December — yay!



JLC COVID-19 research generates national interest

Dr Shannon Bennetts was featured in the media in July this year, following publication of her <u>lead-author paper in PLOS ONE</u>. Her research examined the role of pets for families with children during the COVID-19 pandemic. Children with stronger bonds with their pets were found to be experiencing greater anxiety. It is likely that children who were feeling distressed or unsettled were seeking additional comfort from their pets. 'Baggarrook Yarrongi' program wins the Engagement Australia 2022 Excellence Awards prize for "Excellence in Indigenous Engagement" *engagementaustralia*

The 'Baggarrook Yarrongi (Women's Journey) – Improving the health of First Nations mothers and babies' project aimed to assess the capacity of the maternity services to implement, embed and sustain a culturally responsive caseload midwifery model for women having a First Nations baby. The broader aim was to help 'close the gap' in maternal and infant health outcomes for First Nations people. The project was conducted by Helen McLauchlan, Michelle Newton, Della Forster, Fiona McLardie Hore, Pamela (Res) McCalman, Tanisha Springall, Touran Shafiei and team in partnership with the Victorian Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation (VACCHO), and three Melbourne hospitals (the Royal Women's Hospital, Joan Kirner Hospital, and the Mercy Hospital for Women).

The Engagement Australia Award for Excellence in Indigenous Engagement recognises "outstanding collaborations between tertiary education and Indigenous communities in Australia, New Zealand and beyond, that directly reduce disadvantage, and empower and give voice to First Nations peoples."

The Award was presented at a gala dinner held in Sydney on the 21 November 2022 as part of the Engagement Australia Conference; the work of 24 finalists across seven award categories were celebrated. Our huge congratulations to Helen, Della, Michelle, Fiona, Res, Tanisha, Touran and team! Helen and the team also won La Trobe's <u>Vice-Chancellor's Research Excellence Awards Excellence in Industry Engagement</u>.


